### ENGINEERING AND SCIENCE CAREER DAY

On Wednesday, April 14, forty companies employing graduates in engineering and the physical sciences will be set up in the HUB ballroom from 9:30 - 3:30, to enable recruiters to talk to students. Simultaneously, recruitment films provided by the companies will be shown in 106B HUB, and a series of seminars on the future of various fields and the job search process will be held in 200 B and C and 309 HUB. Schedules of the films and seminars will be posted outside the rooms and in the HUB ballroom. All interested students, faculty, and staff are invited to attend.

### CHANGE-OF-REGISTRATION FEE WAIVED FOR CERTAIN MATH COURSES

Because the math department does not overload its courses, instructing students instead to add the course after registered students have begun to withdraw, the \$15 change-of-registration fee will be waived if the following conditions ALL apply:

1. The math course the student is adding was closed the first week of the quarter.
2. The only change the student is making is the addition of the math course.
3. The change is made by the end of the third week of the quarter.

Students do not need to obtain any signature for the waiver.

### ENGINEERING ADVISING HAS MOVED

The Engineering Advising Office has moved from the Engineering Library to 353 Loew Hall, formerly the Engineering Registration Office. The phone number and mail stop remain the same.

### HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE CONFERENCE

The annual High School and College Conference, sponsored by the UW Office of Admissions, will be held this year on April 29 and 30. The main program will be Friday, April 30, in the HUB ballroom. The theme of this year's meeting will be the role of the university in enhancing college preparatory programs at both the high school and community college level. Since the University of California system has been particularly active in this area, Phillip Curtis, professor of mathematics at UCLA, will describe their experiences. Dr. Curtis is chairman of the Subcommittee on Articulation with High Schools of the state's Board of Admissions and Relations with Schools. Other speakers will include Dr. Ramesh Gangolli, chairman of the UW mathematics department, and Herman Lujan, UW Vice President for Minority Affairs. ### CHANGES IN ELIGIBILITY FOR TEACHER CERTIFICATION

Effective Winter Quarter 1983, admission to the College of Education Teacher Certification Program will require a GPA at or above the all-University mean GPA, currently 3.01. The present requirement is a 2.5 GPA. Applicants must also perform somewhat higher on the California Achievement Test than is presently required.

### CYTOTECHNOLOGY TRAINING PROGRAM

A certificate program in cytotechnology is currently available at Harborview Medical Center. Cytotechnologists usually work in the pathology departments of hospitals and private laboratories. Clinical cytologists are trained to recognize different types of cells; they conduct laboratory tests involved in the diagnosis of certain diseases, especially cancer.

The full-time, day program starts each September and lasts one year. At present there is no tuition fee. Applicants must present at least 90 college credits, including 21 hours of approved biological sciences. Only a small number of students are admitted each year, and students who have completed a bachelor's degree are preferred.
