The APAC Exempt Personnel Committee, established to carry on the work started by the Exempt Task Force last year, will determine issues important to exempt advisers and counselors and present them to David Williams, Director of Personnel Services, and Frank Aff, Exempt Personnel Administrator. CONFIDENTIALITY OF STUDENT RECORDS, II

Last month's article about the confidentiality of student records and what information the University will release was slightly in error. Students who release directory information by marking the appropriate circle on the mark-sense registration form will have their addresses released only in the Student Directory, which anyone can purchase at the University Book Store. Addresses are not given out over the phone. Also, if a student does not release directory information, the exact statement made over the phone is "We have a record, but the student has asked that we not release any information."

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON -- 2000

"University of Washington -- 2000" is a planning project proposed and adopted by the UW Board of Regents at their September meeting. The purpose of this project is to propose goals for the University from 1986 to 2000 and to make recommendations concerning how they can be achieved. The University's constituent groups (students, faculty, administration, alumni, friends, and supporters) are represented by committees that have each been instructed to identify five potential broad goals of primary importance to their group. After these committees have completed their reports (by January 1), President Gerberding and the Regents will evaluate the proposals and communicate them to the public. It is hoped that "from the input of all these groups a sound, common-sense set of objectives will emerge that will allow the University to establish sensible, attainable goals for 'University of Washington -- 2000.'"

As one of the 15 members of the staff committee (a sub-committee of the administration group), I would appreciate hearing from the other advisers and counselors concerning their ideas for the future direction of the University and any suggestions for accomplishing these goals. Working with the current University mission statement, very briefly stated as "the preservation, development, and dissemination of knowledge," our committee has been asked to start with these broad questions:

1. What are the strengths of our group/the University relative to the mission?
2. What are weaknesses and what are obstacles that prevent us from furthering the mission?
3. What can our group/the University do to really make a difference in the University's future?

Please contact me by December 13 with any questions concerning this project and suggestions for our staff committee. We are not always asked for our opinions so this time when we have been, it's important that we speak up clearly and with a strong vision of what we'd like the University to become.
