



APAC Hires a Lobbyist

Martha Brasfield reports that APAC has hired two lobbyists to go to Olympia for us and lead our battle for higher salaries. Sharon Foster has ties to the Democratic Party and to Western Washington congressional delegates, and Dick Barrett has ties to the Republican Party and to Eastern Washington delegates. We seem to be well-covered. Martha's fundraising effort netted us \$1600, but both lobbyists recommend we try to double or triple the amount. APAC members who donated funds during the drive will receive a detailed report (plus plea for more). Foreign Language Placement

Beginning autumn quarter 1987, students will no longer be given credit for the first-quarter course (usually numbered '101') in the language they presented for admission to the university. At first blush, this ruling seems fairly easy to understand and implement; the attendant complications and effects remain to be seen. Some things to keep in mind:

- 1. This ruling only affects students who enter college autumn quarter, 1987, or later.
- 2. Students may be given credit for first-quarter language courses in languages studied in high school other than the one presented for admission.
- 3. Language instructors in the first-year French, Spanish, and German courses will (computer-willing) have placement scores of their students included on their class lists. Students in 102 and 103 courses who have not presented placement test scores will be asked to take the test.

Reminder About International Students

International students are <u>required</u> to be full-time (12 or more undergraduate credits) each quarter. Many of these students are also required to take ESL courses, which carry no credit towards graduation. ESL courses do, however, count as 5-credit courses in determining full-time status. Students who are required to take ESL courses and do not sign up for these courses may have their registration cancelled, and then will be eligible for deportation. Do urge your students to take these classes. The only undergraduate exception to the full-time rule applies to students in their last quarter of school who have less than 12 credits left to complete their degrees.

New Adviser in CAO

W Courses, and the Crunch -- Janet Kime

Those of you who received quarterly course information accompanied by Dick Simkins' Crunch memo probably noticed that your stack of handouts was somewhat smaller this quarter. Two of my favorites fell to the budget ax: the evening course list, and the W-course list. We did send copies of the W-course list to advisers, but no longer print enough for students to pick up copies in B-10; and the evening list we wrote up and xeroxed only for ourselves in Central Advising. I did sneak up to the xerox machine to make extra copies and sent them to a few advisers; we have a little private mailing list of advisers who see lots of students, or are easily freaked, or both. At any rate, now that you have survived most of registration without an evening-course list, let us know if you think you could do so again, or if you found this a particularly painful experience.

We feel a little easier about cutting back on the W-course list, because a list appears in the front of each quarter's Time Schedule; please refer students to that. It is very rare that a course listed there has its W removed (and if that happens, we have the instructor announce it in class); we do, however, always add a few W courses after the Time Schedule is printed. We post a revised list in B-10 for students to check.

I've been looking at all the graduation applications of yellow-list students for the W-Course Committee, to see what people are taking to fulfill the requirement, and am truly appalled at the number of students who have not completed the W course requirement by the time they apply to graduate. I'm even more concerned about the number who are planning on overlapping their remaining W course and distribution requirements. W courses, if you haven't heard from your students, are hard to get into -- particularly the lower-division, distribution-list ones. With that in mind, and because so many students are finishing up in Spring quarter and graduating in June, I prepared a list for our office of the W courses this Spring in each distribution area. It is a grim little list, indeed. Advisers should be aware that the W courses that are on the distribution lists as well are almost all in language and literature. This Spring, for example, there are none in fine arts, the only two in natural sciences are the third quarters of two physics sequences, and there are very few in either social science subcategory. If you are talking to a student who desperately needs a W course that will also apply to a distribution area, give one of the advisers at CAO a call.
