CHANGES IN ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE TEACHER CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

Students who begin either the elementary or secondary teacher certification program in Winter 1986 or later must have completed at least 90% of their major prior to admission, rather than the current 70%. Students have been and will continue to be advised to complete 100% prior to admission, but the actual prerequisite will become 90%. It is also highly recommended that students who have a minor teaching field complete that as well before beginning the certification program.

The UW has been one of the few schools in this state requiring an entrance test (the California Achievement Test, CAT) for admission to its certification program. Now the State Board of Education has decided all students entering certification programs in the state must have an acceptable score on the Washington Pre-College Test (or SAT or ACT). For those applying to the UW's program for Winter Quarter, both the CAT and the Washington Pre-College Test will be required. Students will be required to achieve a score of at least 200 on the CAT, with no subtest lower than the 50th percentile, and meet the state requirement on the WPCT, a combined score of at least 80 on the verbal composite and quantitative composite. When a sufficient sample group of UW certification students with the WPCT is available, the minimum score that will be required in the future for UW students will be determined. The UW's minimum will possibly be somewhat higher than the state's minimum requirement. For Winter quarter admission, however, we will use the scores mentioned above. Information about scheduling tests and obtaining scores is available at 211 Miller.

As soon as it has been determined which test(s) and score(s) will be required for Spring 1986 admission, the information will be made available.

This year, for the first time since a quota on admissions was established, we have had more qualified applicants to both elementary and secondary certification than we can admit. Because of this, it is important to let students know that even if they have the minimum test scores and GPA, it does not necessarily mean they will be admitted to the program.
