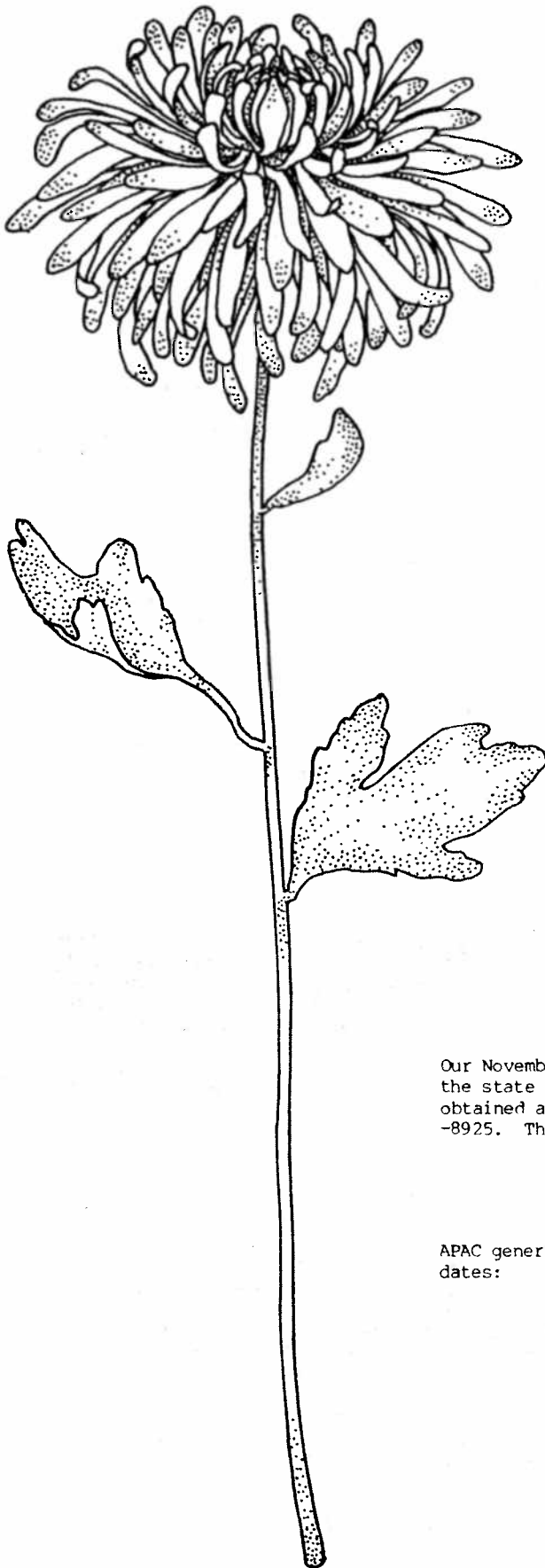
## NOVEMBER MEETING: PAT LUNNEBORG

### DUES ARE DUE

### FOREIGN LANGUAGE SUBSTITUTION APPROVED FOR DISABLED STUDENTS

Students who are admitted to the UW under a waiver of the foreign language admission requirement because of deafness or learning disability will be allowed to substitute certain approved foreign culture courses for the foreign language required under the new proficiency requirement. This substitution applies only to a very few students (only one was admitted in 1984-85), and only to students under the new proficiency requirement. A list of the approved foreign culture courses is available from the advisers at the Central Advising Office.

### CAREERS WITH THE FOREIGN BROADCAST INFORMATION SERVICE

Ed Rova, Chief of the U.S.S.R. Division of the Foreign Broadcast Information Service (a division of the CIA) will speak at an informational meeting on Wednesday, November 6, at 3:00 p.m. in 215 Loew Hall. The session is sponsored by the Placement Center.

### CHANGE IN BOTANY DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

Botany, which previously offered only a B.S. degree, is now offering both a B.S. and a B.A. The B.A. degree requirements are the same as the previous degree. The new B.S. program requires the same botany courses, but has additional supporting-course requirements in chemistry, physics, mathematics, and foreign language. ### NEW S/NS REQUIREMENT

As we all know, the S/NS regulations were changed effective this Autumn quarter. Starting this Autumn, no required course may be taken S/NS, including proficiency, distribution, W-course, and major requirements. Only electives may be taken S/NS. Students who requested classes S/NS during the long summer preregistration for Autumn quarter were sent letters explaining the new regulations. Students who preregistered in May were not specially notified, although the new rules were posted and made as public as possible. Because inevitably there will be some confusion, there will be some leniency this quarter in allowing students who registered for courses S/NS to change to a grade instead. As in the past, students who want to change after the official change-of-registration period at the beginning of the quarter should be sent to the Central Advising Office. There will be no special leniency for students who want to change from a grade to S/NS; as in the past, such changes will be allowed only in case of University error.

### COMINGS AND GOINGS

Over the summer there has been quite a bit of turnover in advising offices on campus. Kathleen Waldron of Central Advising and Pam Salvatore of Minority Affairs both left to take positions as high school career counselors in the Shoreline district. Doris Kelly of Central Advising retired, and Wanda Boykin decided not to return after taking a year's leave. Ken Etzkorn did return after a year's leave mostly spent in Japan, and he spent a rather befuddled and harassed summer trying to catch up on all the requirements that changed while he was gone. Central Advising has three new advisers: Cynthia Merrill, an English graduate student and former English department adviser, works half-time; Lindsay Michimoto, from romance languages and literature, replaces Kathleen in pre-med and engineering adviser; and Ken Tokuno, a transplant from Hawaii, replaces Doris in allied-health programs.

Sarah Butler left psychology to go east with her husband, and has been replaced by Betsy Crampton. Julia Herschensohn replaces Lindsay in romance. Judith Katlizki left business advising to teach in business communications, and was replaced by Ron Ficek. Cece Field temporarily replaces Barbara Deane of Biology/Zoology/Botany, who is on leave. Lance Miller is the new drama adviser, and Joseph Galagan the new forest resources adviser. In EOP, Tony Shedrick and Ralph Barnes are new advisers, and Raul Anaya has been promoted to Assistant Director of Counseling Services. And Stan Chernicoff is now advising Geology undergraduates. Welcome all.

RESULTS OF THE FOREIGN LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY TESTS

The new foreign language proficiency test was offered for the first time this year in French, Spanish, and German. Students who passed both the written and oral exams are exempt from the new foreign language proficiency requirement. The test was recommended only to students who had taken three or four years of foreign language in high school and had received high grades; the results were rather grim.

This autumn also for the first time entry cards were required for first-year French, Spanish, and German classes, and for the first time students in first-year French and Spanish courses were given a replacement test on the second day of the quarter, and then replaced into higher- or lower-level courses en masse. Overall, about half of the students were replaced into lower-level classes. Although Lindsay Michimoto and Dick Newcomb performed valiantly and deserve gold stars, the whole incident was rather dreadful and the procedure hopefully will be reorganized and modified for winter quarter.
