Prospective UW Students

Application Requirements

If you have never attended UW as a matriculated student, you must complete a separate application to the UW in addition to your Business School application. Check the various application deadlines at: www.washington.edu/students/uga/.

- UW Admissions Office: 206.543.9686
- Admission to the Business School is contingent upon admission to the UW.
- If you have taken more than 3 upper-division business courses at another institution, consult with an academic adviser in the Business School before applying.

Graduation Requirements

International Applicants

- English composition: For application, one 3-5 credit course must be completed in Australia, Canada, Ireland, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, or the United States, or taken at an international school where English is the language of instruction.
- Introduction to Law (Management 200): This course covers the American legal system; it is not a business law course. If you are not able to take a comparable course in the U.S., you may petition to take it during your first quarter, if admitted to the UW Business School.

Post baccalaureate Applicants

Which Application?

Application Requirements

There are two applications in this packet. Read the descriptions below to determine which application you should use.

Upper Division Admission Group (UAG)

To apply for the UAG, you must have by the end of winter 2005:

- completed a minimum of 60 credits at the UW or an approved transfer institution, including the credits for the prerequisite courses listed on the application.

Early Admission Group (EAG)

To be considered for the EAG, you must have by the end of winter 2005:

- entered the UW as a freshman AND
- have been enrolled no more than 3 quarters AND
- have completed at least 30 numerically graded credits at the UW. If you have completed a total of 60 credits at any college or university, you must apply as a UAG.

Transcripts

All academic work completed by April 5, 2005, will be reviewed in the application process.

- If you have taken courses from any college other than the UW (even if you were still in high school), you must submit unofficial grade reports with your application to the Business School.
- In order for transfer credits to be added to your UW record, you must also request official transcripts be sent to the Office of Admissions.
- If you have attended only the UW, you do not need to submit any transcripts with your Business School application.

Personal Statement

Your personal statement is required for application. It provides the opportunity to discuss aspects of your life that may not be apparent from your application, transcripts, or the Writing Skills Assessment. For an effective personal statement, follow directions outlined in Section E of the application.

Application Guidelines

☐ Sample Completed Applications

As you fill in Section B of the application, keep the following guidelines and information in mind.

EAG and UAG APPLICANTS - Section B-1 & 2

- *Be specific. List department and course number (e.g. MATH 112 for calculus).*
- *Use the transfer school's course numbers, not the UW equivalents.*
- *Convert semester credits to quarter credits by multiplying times 1.5 (for example, a 3 credit semester course becomes a 4.5 credit quarter course).*
- *You may use Advanced Placement (AP) courses to satisfy prerequisites. Enter the name of the course for which you received credit (e.g. MATH 124 for calculus), leave blank the number of credits earned, write "AP" under decimal grade and leave blank the number of grade points. Do not include AP credits in the totals.*

UAG APPLICANTS ONLY – Section B-1

- *Accounting: If you are transferring from a school where the fundamentals of accounting are taught in a 3-course series (e.g. 201,202,203 or 210,220,230) you must complete at least the first course (201 or 210) before the application deadline. The remaining 2 courses (202,203 or 220,230) must be completed before September 28, 2005. If you have already completed the first two courses (e.g. 201 & 202 or 210 & 220), you may list the course in which you received the higher grade.*
- *Economics: If you have completed both micro- and macro-economics prior to the application deadline, you may indicate your higher grade. Both courses must be completed before September 28, 2005.*
- *Calculus: If you have taken more than one calculus course, you may indicate your highest grade.*
- *English Composition: If you have taken more than one composition course, you may indicate your highest grade.*

UAG APPLICANTS ONLY—Section B-2

- *Indicate the quarter and year you took (or plan to take) the course. Indicate the school at which you took (or plan to take) the course.*
- *Introduction to Law (MGMT/O E 200): This is not a business law course but is an introduction to the American legal system.*

- *Statistics (Q METH 201): You are strongly encouraged to take Q METH 201 because it is business related statistics. We will accept several approved substitutes listed on the Application Requirements handout.*

Application to Options

☐ Option Handouts

You are applying to be a business major. You may also apply for **one** formal option at this time. Space in options is limited, so you could be admitted to the Business School, but not be admitted to an option.

Note: You may apply for only one Formal Option. If you indicate more than one Formal Option, your application will be considered for only Business Administration.

However, if you are admitted as a business major, you will have other opportunities to apply for up to two options.

Options are formalized programs of study, which require completing certain coursework. Admission to an option gives you registration priority for upper-division classes in that area. Upon graduation from the UW, if you have successfully completed the option requirements, it will be noted on your transcript.

It provides you with the opportunity to discuss aspects of your life that may not be apparent from information provided on your application, transcripts, or the Writing Skills Assessment.

TOPICS: Please answer all of the topics that pertain to you. If only part of a topic pertains to you, answer that part. The topics are in four numbered sections. Similarly, your statement should be organized into sections, with each section numbered. Such presentation makes it easier for the reviewers to read and assess your statement.

1. Describe any personal or economic hardships or barriers you've had to overcome and explain how they have affected your education. Be specific about when you encountered these hardships and how long they lasted.
2. In the context of your life experience, describe your understanding of cultural differences, how this awareness was acquired, and how it affected you.
3. Write about any experience you've had that demonstrates your leadership skills. Examples could be taken from: employment, community service, student organizations, or similar situations. Be specific about when you had these experience(s) and how long they lasted.
4. How have the educational experiences of your parents/legal guardians influenced your pursuit of higher education? If you are the first person in your family to go to college, what kind of support did you receive in making and pursuing this decision?

FORMAT: Type or write your statement on no more than three sheets of 8.5 x 11" white paper. If typed, use at least 10-point font size. Double space your lines, and use only one side of each sheet. Additional pages will not be read. Print your name and the words "Personal Statement" at the top of each page, and attach the pages to your application.

TIPS: (1) Be specific. (2) Don't spend your time telling us such things as "I've always wanted to attend the Business School because I want a business degree." It is a legitimate comment but doesn't tell us anything distinctive about you. (3) You define what "experience" means to you: something insignificant to others may have had particular significance for you. We don't expect to read something earth shattering in every personal statement. (6) When you address the cultural awareness question, we want to know what has affected your perspective and what awareness you would bring to the Business School community. We are interested in the depth of your perceptions and experiences. (7) Proofread, proofread, proofread.
