## UNIVERSITY OF VICTORIA OPENS NEW COMMUNITY-BASED RESEARCH OFFICE

*Office also to host Community-University Exposition in May 2008 – Proposals due November 15, 2007*

The **University of Victoria**, a member of **CCPH**, has recently opened an Office of Community-Based Research (OCBR). The first university-wide initiative of its kind in the country, the OCBR will create and support research partnerships that enhance the social, environmental and economic well-being of communities. It will be a focal point for university faculty and students who are doing or wish to do community-based research, and an open door for community groups to access UVic research partners. It will also make evidence-based recommendations for new policies, programs and practices to meet community needs.

"With many of the social, environmental, health and economic issues facing us today we need research that engages those who are working on the front lines," says **CCPH Member Budd Hall**, director of the OCBR. "Issues in Victoria, such as homelessness or climate change, are best understood and acted upon when those working to find solutions are driving the research."

The OCBR was created after two years of consultation with community groups and First Nations in the Victoria region and across Vancouver Island. It is guided by a 16-member steering committee composed equally of university and community members, and an 11-member advisory committee of national and international experts and practitioners that include **CCPH Executive Director Sarena Seifer**.

UVic has a large number of nationally and internationally respected leaders in community-based research in fields such as environmental studies, health promotion, coastal studies, assistive technologies, Indigenous and cultural studies, and education. "The OCBR will have a special focus on partnerships with First Nations communities. Aboriginal studies at UVic and elsewhere is one of the fields where the commitment to community-based research is strongest," says Hall.

The University of Victoria is also co-hosting the Community-University Exposition 2008 (CUexpo), May 4-7, 2008, in Victoria. This third bi-annual conference promises to bring together local, national and international people, projects and issues highlighting university-community partnerships. **CCPH** is delighted to be a conference supporting organization. ## **NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH SEEKS COMMENTS ON IMPROVING PEER REVIEW SYSTEM**

*Written Comments Due September 7, Consultation Meetings to Be Held This Fall*

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) is seeking input on all aspects of its peer review system. This is an important opportunity to "weigh in" on how community-based participatory research (CBPR) proposals and community-based applicants can be disadvantaged by the current system and to make recommendations for change. ## **ADVANCING EDUCATORS AND EDUCATION: DEFINING THE COMPONENTS AND EVIDENCE OF EDUCATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP**

The Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) has issued a report, Advancing Educators and Education: Defining the Components and Evidence of Educational Scholarship. Authored by the AAMC Group on Education Affairs Conference on Educational Scholarship, the report outlines a set of documentation standards based on more than fifteen years of literature and the findings from the Group's 2006 Consensus Conference on Educational Scholarship. Five educator activity categories (teaching, curriculum, advising/mentoring, educational leadership/administration, and learner assessment) were confirmed and contents delineated with examples created to illustrate documentation of quantity, quality and engagement in educational scholarship. The report recommends that implementation of the standards should parallel the development of an infrastructure to support educators. Infrastructure elements include sustained faculty development programs for educators, e-learning platforms for delivery of instruction, access to resources and journals in the field, peer review mechanisms, consultation and support for curriculum development, evaluation and educational measurement.

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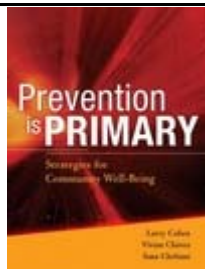

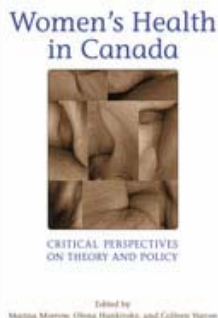

To lay out the methodological and theoretical foundations for their study, editors Olena Hankivsky, Marina Morrow, and Colleen Varcoe bring together an interdisciplinary group of scholars and practitioners from economics, anthropology, sociology, nursing, political studies, women's studies, and psychology.
