FIRST ANNUAL SEATTLE ALL-INDIAN BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

"HEAP PLENTY HOOP GAME"

The Tillicum Village and Alaskan basketball teams of Seattle will be host to 14 other all-Indian basketball teams from the states of Washington, Oregon, and Alaska, and one from British Columbia, Canada on December 12th, 13th and 14th at the Fort Lawton Gymnasium.

A one dollar admission will be charged for each day. Trophies will be awarded to the first 8 places, 12 all-stars, most valuable player, high scorer, sportsmanship, team and hoop shoot winner.

Participating teams are from Hoonah,

Alaska, Warm Springs, Oregon, the Yakima Papouees, Nisqually, Tahtial, the Tacoma Bucks, Tulalip, LaConner, Hoquiam, Vancouver, B.C., Lummi and LaPush in Washington plus four Seattle teams, the Thunderbirds, Roadrunners, Tillicums and Alaskan Nuggets.

A "Keg Party and Dance" will follow the last game Saturday night at the the Aero-Mechanics Hall, 5515 Airport Way South.

We are told that every Tuesday night at the Indian mission located adjacent to what used to be Cushman Hospital, there is Indian dancing too. All Indians welcome.

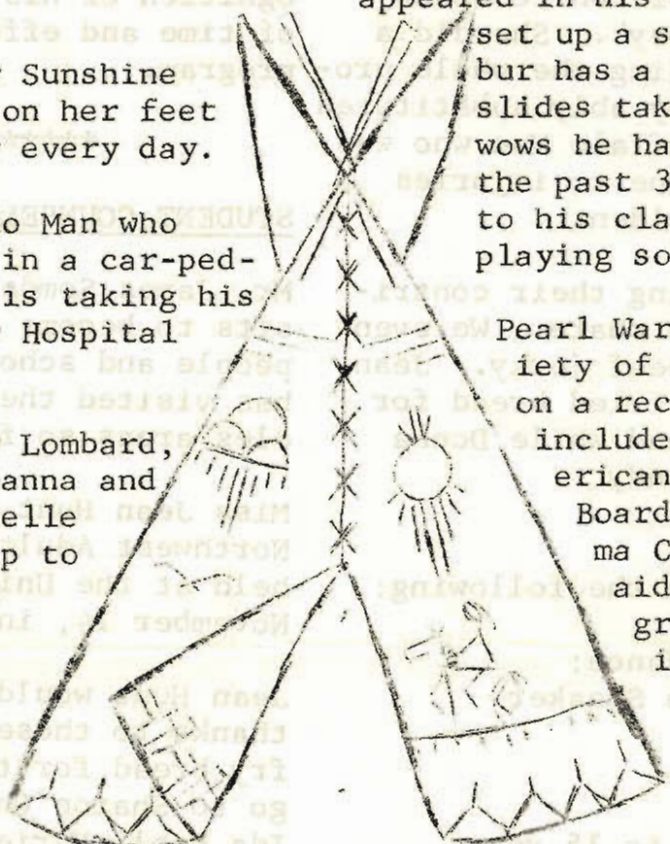
Martha Hardy, teacher at the Bellevue High School, brought 17 students to tour the Indian Center.
