COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to assist and empower primary care providers (PCPs) in their office management of patients with chronic non-malignant pain. The general tenor is one of practicality to provide useful information and skills to help the PCP in day to day office practice such as in opioid conversion, interpretation of urine toxicology and strategies for the management of challenging patient discussions. Emerging regulatory policies will be previewed.
