The Position

This position is targeted for the GS-5 level:

The minimum qualifications for this position are (1) FFT1 with a completion certificate for S-290, (2) and time in grade at the GS-4 or equivalent.

- *Be sure and attach your Incident Qualifications and Certifications Systems (IQCS) record.
- *Knowledge of pumps, engine operations, fire tactics, and fire incident management is recommended.

This primary purpose of this position is to serve as the Senior Fire Fighter/Fire Engine Operator of a **type 3** fire engine module. The incumbent has primary responsibility becoming proficient in the driving and operation of the engine in responding to wildland fires and other all hazard activities. This is considered a primary covered position for purposes of fire fighter retirement under the provisions of 5 USC.8336

This is an arduous position. The incumbent will have to pass a medical examination and the pack test at the arduous level (three mile hike on level ground while carrying a 45 lbs pack within 45 minutes) as a condition of employment.

May require the incumbent to obtain and maintain a Commercial Driver's License (CDL). If CDL is required/attained, all applications for, and incumbents of this position are subject to random alcohol and drug testing. This announcement constitutes 30 days advance notice. Selectee should plan to meet the requirements for a Class-B CDL within 180 days (if not already in possession of a valid CDL).

The position (FS1477):

- Performs and leads (as qualified), direct fire suppression efforts using such firefighting tools as axe, shovel, Pulaski, McCloud, chainsaws, etc., in initial attack, fire line construction, and mop-up activities.
- Learn to operate PTO, slip-on, or portable pumps, lays out hose lays as appropriate, determines best method of attack and makes decisions related to tactics.
- Maintains specialized equipment and tools in prescribed manner. Also performs fuels treatments and prescribed burning as assigned.
- On project fires, serves as specialist according to Red Card rating.
- Quality leadership skills and is motivated to teach others.
- Someone who creates a work environment that respects, appreciates, and accepts the contributions and perspectives of all employees.
- May be assigned work for other resource management activities, such as recreation, timber, or reforestation when not performing fire suppression duties.
- The work is directly related to wildland fire suppression and control activities including suppression, preparedness, prevention, monitoring, hazardous fuels reduction, and prescribed burning.
- This position provides leadership to the crew as assigned in the performance of this work.
- A safe and professional working attitude is a must.

ABOUT THE EASTSIDE OF THE MT. HOOD AND THE COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE

The Barlow and Hood River Ranger Districts have a variety of complex ecological conditions due to extremes in climatic factors such as precipitation, temperature and wind, topographic features, elevation, geology and landforms, and vegetative type. Diverse ecosystems range from the pine-oak type at the low elevations, to mixed conifer forest, to high elevation, alpine forests. These diverse ecosystems provide numerous (16+) commercial tree species, plus noncommercial tree species and other desired vegetation. In addition, exclusion of fire, past management activities, drought, and insect and disease infestations have altered some of these ecosystems adding to the complexity for current management. Non-native species, including both noxious weeds and exotic insects and disease are a high concern on both districts and also add to the complexity for management.

The land base for the Barlow and Hood River Ranger Districts encompasses approximately 385,000 acres. There is a diversity of geographic, climatic, and biotic areas. Elevations range from 100 feet at the Columbia River to 11,235 feet at the summit of Mt. Hood. The land base is located east of the Cascade Crest and receives 45 inches of precipitation a year (Hood River District) to areas with as little as 25 inches per year on the Barlow District. Spring and fall are wet with temperatures dropping into the 30s and 40s. Summers are usually dry with temperatures in the 70s and 80s. Land and resource management on the forest is directed by the Mt. Hood Land and Resource Management Plan as amended by the Northwest Forest Plan. For additional information about the Mt. The Columbia River Gorge is a spectacular river canyon, 80 miles long and up to 4,000 feet deep, cutting the only sea level route through the Cascade Mountain Range. It is more than a natural wonder; the Gorge is a critical transportation corridor and is home to 75,000 people, resource dependent communities, farms, and schools. The Columbia River Gorge Scenic Area was established in 1986 and encompasses 292,500 acres.
