The Graduate School of Oceanography invites applications for a tenure-track Assistant Professorship in biological or chemical coastal oceanography. The position will be filled at the Assistant Professor level as an academic-year (nine-month) appointment. The anticipated start date is September 2015.

Located on the water's edge at the URI Narragansett Bay Campus, the GSO is the State's center for marine studies, research and outreach. Major facilities and programs at the GSO include the R/V Endeavor, the Coastal Resources Center, the Office of Marine Programs, Rhode Island SeaGrant, and the Inner Space Center.
