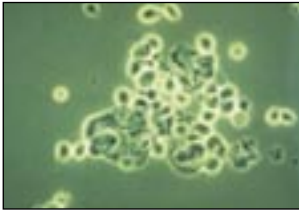

Examination of Vaginal Wet Preps

This video provides basic instruction on preparing and examining vaginal wet preps, including through-the-microscope footage of trichomonads, yeast, and clue cells associated with BV, allowing the viewer to quickly learn essential differentiation skills. The straight-forward approach, clear visuals, and comprehensive coverage of determining the presence of infection make it an essential resource for all STD labs. Caring Inside the Wall: HIV Treatment in the Correctional Setting

AEGIS Award Winner

Structured around four cases studies, this video explores issues including intake of inmates claiming to be on HIV medications; factors to consider in beginning HAART therapy; adherence and pill lines versus keep-on-person medication regimens; transition issues; and Hepatitis C co-infection. Featuring interviews with leading national experts on HIV and corrections, the film includes segments shot in Washington's McNeil Island Correctional Center.

Join HIV specialists David Spach, MD, Deborah Royal, RN, ANP, and psychiatrist Victoria Harris, MD, along with a focus group of clients, in a fast-paced program with five sections: Stabilizing and Reducing Harm; Beginning Antiretroviral Therapy; Drug Interactions; Pain Management; and Supporting Adherence.

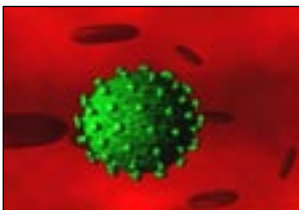

HIV/AIDS Antiretroviral Therapy Update

Dr. David Spach presents an update on current recommendations for the treatment of HIV using antiretroviral therapy. This presentation synthesizes recent research to provide health care workers with new information on DHHS guidelines, medications, ARV resistance and lipoatrophy (fat wasting).

HIV Resistance Testing: A Case-Based Overview for Clinical Practice

Presented by three expert HIV clinicians, this program provides an overview of HIV genotyping and phenotyping, discusses clinical applications, and answers basic questions care providers may have. Doctors David Spach, Christopher Behrens, and Robert Harrington explore several cases in depth in a round table discussion that provides real-life examples of the complexities, and in some cases controversies, involved in using resistance testing in the clinical setting.

Management of HIV/Hepatitis C Co-Infection: A Roundtable

In this video a roundtable of expert clinicians from the University of Washington and the Northwest AETC faculty discuss HIV/Hepatitis C co-infection. Through a case-based approach, they explore issues including epidemiology of HCV in HIV-infected persons, vaccines for HCV-infected persons, evaluation prior to initiating therapy for HCV, preferred regimens for treating HCV infection, antiretroviral medications to avoid while treating HCV, duration of therapy, basic laboratory monitoring after starting therapy, management of anemia, depression with HCV therapy, management of 12 week non-responder, patient with HCV and active substance use, and screening for hepatocellular carcinoma.

A case-based overview of current recommendations for the treatment of occupational exposures to HIV, this lecture explores a variety of typical scenarios and provides specific recommendations, based on current CDC guidelines, for treatment with antiretroviral medications.

This lecture-style presentation explores oral manifestations of HIV/AIDS in the era of antiretroviral medications. Illustrated with clinical slides, the program presents ulcerations, lesions, viral infections, candidiasis, and related oral manifestations of HIV/AIDS.

Pregnant and Positive: Issues in Clinical Care and Support

Pregnant and Positive explores clinical care for HIV-infected women before, during and after pregnancy through interviews with three medical experts and an HIV-positive, pregnant woman, modeled clinical encounters, and an epidemiological overview. The film provides guidance and recommendations for primary care providers, including those who manage OB/GYN care but are not experienced in treating HIV-infected pregnant women.

Primary HIV Infection: Recognition and Diagnosis

Topics covered in this 25-minute, lecture-style video include: identifying primary HIV infection, diagnostic tests for HIV, pre- and post-test counseling, and a summary of the importance of identifying HIV early. Vignettes with patients illustrate approaches providers can use when doing risk assessments and pre- and post-test counseling.

Share the stories of three HIV-positive Native Americans, and explore the challenges each has faced through discrimination and lack of access to skilled medical care in their communities. Designed to destigmatize HIV and foster discussion, this film has been widely screened in Northwest Native communities. It is introduced by Native actor Floyd Redcrow Westerman, and features the music of award-winning musician Robert Mirabal.

Filmed on location in Los Angeles, and hosted by Dr. Octavio Vallejo of UCLA, Creando Nuestro Futuro includes a diverse array of experiences and a distinctly Latino perspective on the hope and the challenge presented by current HIV regimens, this video is a culturally appropriate source of education and support for Spanish-speaking clients who are "creating a future."
