*Hypatia: A Journal of Feminist Philosophy* is a quarterly journal that publishes two general issues and two thematic special issues each year. The special issues and their guest editors are selected by the Editors in consultation with the Associate Editors who jointly serve as the policy making group for the journal.

If you are interested in guest editing a special issue, send us a proposal consisting of:

- a narrative that explains why there ought to be a special issue of *Hypatia* on the topic you propose, and an account of the kind of work you would expect to include in the issue;
- a list of the feminist philosophers and theorists who are doing work on this subject or in this field who might either (or both) contribute to the issue or serve as readers of submitted manuscripts;
- a draft of the call for papers for the issue and a preliminary list of places where the call would be posted or published;
- a copy of your C.V. and a statement about your qualifications for, and interest in, editing such a special issue.

The editors will circulate your proposal to the Associate Editors, and provide you with a decision and feedback as quickly as possible. Please submit your proposal and all supporting documents to the Managing Editor at: [hypatia@u.washington.edu](mailto:hypatia@u.washington.edu).

The entire process, from the time the call for papers is published until the special issue is in print, takes approximately two years: a year for the call to circulate and papers to be written, and a year to review, revise, edit, and publish the issue. Special issues are frequently scheduled considerably in advance, so it may be as much as three or four years from the time of your proposal to publication.
