Seattle's ordinary Sunday quiet was more marked than usual on the fourth day of the great sympathetic strike of all crafts in behalf of the shipyard workers. The general strike committee, which had been in session until 4 a. m., did not attempt to reconvene during the day, and the only activity around the Labor Temple was connected with serving meals by the commissary department.

Owing to the fact that the Union Record did not issue an edition except right after the general committee turned down the proposal to call the strike off, there was an abundance of rumors of all sorts, but the morale of the strikers remained unbroken throughout the day. While one or two organizations have taken action ordering their members back to work on the theory that it was necessary to keep them intact, the effort to create a general stampede has signally failed.

The wonderful order maintained by the strikers throughout the entire struggle remains the outstanding feature of the greatest labor demonstration that has ever been staged in America. In spite of the hysterical rantings of the mayor and his apparently deliberate attempt by every means in his main straits, sending truckloads of heavily armed special police in soldiers' uniforms through every gathering of the workers, issuing silly pronouncements in the style of old-time South American revolutionary generals, the workers have kept their heads, and their Public Safety Committee, its every request promptly respected.

The keener disappointment has been expressed in some quarters that the strikers have not "started something" so that the military forces at the disposal of mayor might "clean up." The strikers themselves have realized that their best interest lay in perfect order and there has not been the slightest slip in their plans.

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COMMITTEE OF A. F. OF L. HAS NEW PROGRAM

Executive Council Endorses Reconstruction Program

DECLARE AGAINST MILITARY SERVICE

Government Ownership of Public Utilities Advocated

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The A. F. of L. executive committee has endorsed the report of the committee on reconstruction, which was adopted at the last convention. The report is published in pamphlet form. Demands of the organized workers are summarized as follows:

Democracy in industry.—"It is an incontrovertible fact that the workers as free citizens should remain under the control of the state. The state has a duty to see that the industry and commerce are in that manner controlled so that certain individuals or trusts cannot exercise arbitrary power."

Equalization of trade.—"The trade union legislation that will make an effective effort to interfere with the rights of the legitimate citizens of trade."

Unemployment is due to under consumption.—"Under consumption is caused by low pay for labor. The employment of idle hands is a public wrong, and it is the duty of the state to see that there is no work done with less than a living wage."

Living wage for all.—"A living wage is a wage which will enable the worker and his family to live in health and comfort, provide a reasonable margin for the worker and his family to be able to take advantage of all the opportunities of the country."

Work day of not more than eight hours with a work week of not more than six and one-half days.

Time pay for women and paid time for sick leave.—"The right of women to work should be guaranteed."

Through legislation, step employment of children.—"The child labor law should be strengthened so that no child should be employed in any work that is more than 12 hours in any one week and not less than 25 hours schooling within the year."

Public employees must be denied right to organize or limit any right secured by this act.—"Cooperation is favored, as this means that the worker is free from the employer."

MINIMUM WAGE BILL ARGUED BEFORE SENATE COMMITTEE

Advocate \$1,500 as Basic Wage for Both Men and Women

WALK OUT ALL UNIONS

Walkout to Be for Limited Time With Understanding That They Will Get Places Back at Once

All unions who have returned to their jobs will be required by the general strike committee to walk out again in a limited period with the understanding that at the end of that time all the unions that have taken part in the strike will go back in a body as solid as when they first went out. This plan was adopted by the executive committee after a long conference that the organized labor movement of the city is not "all shot to pieces" as some have claimed and show that the rank and file of the workers can stand solidly together.

The publicity committee announced that the general strike committee was practicing unanimity Monday morning regarding the plan, and that the only difference of opinion was over the length of the period for which the walkout should be called out. The general strike committee will be called off only if it has been fixed at noon.

RESOLUTION TO CALL STRIKE IS ADOPTED

Following is the resolution proposed by the executive committee of the general strike committee, adopted by a vote of 10-2 on Monday:

"That this strike committee do hereby call a general strike of the city of Seattle on Monday, February 10, 1919, at 12 o'clock noon, to be maintained until the general strike committee shall be satisfied that the rank and file of the workers are ready to return to their jobs on their own terms, and that the government is ready to meet the demands of the workers for a 40-hour week, a 100 percent wage increase, and the restoration of the right of free speech and of free assembly."

The strike committee will return to the plants they state that their ranks are as solid as when they first went out, and that there is a probability that the strike will be successful. They are confident that they will succeed in securing a satisfactory settlement.
