LONDON, Feb. 12. - Representatives of more than 1,000,000 British workers met today to discuss wages, hours of employment and working conditions. Miners' delegates, representing 600,000 men, assembled to receive the government's reply to their demands for a 30 per cent wage increase, a six-hour day and nationalization of

The National Union of Railway Men, representing 400,000, discussed the general labor conditions.

The Transport Workers' Federation, speaking for 250,000, will receive the employers' answer to their demands for higher wages and a 44-hour week. Striking shipyard workers in the Clyde district, while ordered back to work today, have been instructed by their committee to prepare for "national action." Premier Lloyd George's speech before the house of commons yesterday, in which he uttered a defi to Prussianism in the ranks of labor, was expected to form one of the principal subjects of debate in the various industrial meetings today.

"Labor's fair demands will be examined carefully," he said, "but in case a demand is pressed for the purpose of holding up a community and destroying the government by brute force, I say, on behalf of the government, that we will fight Prussianism in the industrial world exactly as we fought it on the continent of Europe, with the whole might of the nation."


