"The shipyards and shops may open up Wednesday morning but they will not operate with members of the unions affiliated with the Metal Trades Council—for the following reasons:

"1. The strikers are not defeated and will remain out on strike for an adjustment of wage rates.

"2. The plan under which the yards are intending to operate is a violation of the agreement with the United States employment office, as the yards and shops are intending to hire men at the gate, which shows plainly that the employers all active in the shipyard strike. This will not be the dead by the unions and the internationals will be forced, according to the constitutions, to support all local unions and their members in this matter.

"3. The plan and statements of the employers, as well as Mr. Piez, show plainly that they intend to reduce all workmen to the Macy scale. This means a decided reduction in metal trade union and must be repudiated by all internationals.
