Tomorrow!

Tomorrow is primary election day! Owing to the presence of the shipyard strike and the sympathetic general strike which accompanied it for a while, the workers and their sympathizers in Seattle have had their attention distracted from political matters. Now it is here—and without preparation the people go to the polls tomorrow and select their candidates for the election that will decide whether the destinies of our fair city are to fall into the hands of the people who were built or are to remain in the hands of the representatives of the plunderbund.

There are eight candidates who are appealing for your support—six of whom will be selected for the final runoff in March. Strangely enough there is a fairly accurate grouping of the candidates along class lines, four favoring the endorsement of the Chamber of Commerce, two the endorsement of the Central Labor Council and one of the Metal Trades Council. The four labor men are Albert L. Proctor, president of the Central Labor Council; Ed T. Levi, vice-president of that body; Charles H. Colman, delegate to the Central Labor Council from Electrical Workers Local 77, all endorsed by the council, and J. J. Cassidy endorsed by the Metal Trades Council. The Chamber of Commerce endorses as the three incumbents in the office of city councilmen—William Hickman, H. E. Thompson, and C. B. Fitzgerald—and Fred Kelly, who styles himself a civil engineer.

The Chamber of Commerce has elected to make this election fight. Labor's endorsement was given its candidate because they were labor men, it is true, but also because they are eminently well fitted for the position to which they aspire, while the chamber has taken the position that because they are labor men they shall not be given an opportunity to function as citizens of this community.

It is a charge upon the labor cannot well refuse to meet and it is expected that the polls tomorrow will be held from seven till night with workmen and women maintaining their faith in the men of their own ranks.

Our enemies left us we must resort to force—that there are legal and orderly methods for changing the terms of this government if we desire to change it. We want their advice and present for the suffrage of our own people our own candidates, when we are met with the declaration that workmen must not be elected because, forthwith, they are workmen. We are told this must be a class government and then are instructed to vote for the representatives of another class than our own of all times.

Tomorrow, men and women of organized labor, is the time and the opportunity to make the first move toward making a more and more active interest in our own affairs. Let those who sneer at political action throw their pet theories aside for one day and make a special effort to go to the polls and vote for the candidates endorsed by labor. What if they do not do all you want, you will at least have shown your enemies that you stand shoulder to shoulder politically as well as industrially and that in the future you are going to take that part in political affairs to which your eighty per cent of the voting population entitles you.

Tomorrow, you can put the candidates endorsed by labor at the head of the list.

See to it that you do!

He has threatened a new outbreak of revolution unless the government agrees to socialize the country.

LABOR HATERS DOOMED TO BITTER DISAPPOINTMENT

The hope of every labor-hater in the community that the Metal Trades Council, representing 21 of the biggest strongest unions in Seattle, will be smashed when the wards attempt to resume operations Wednesday morning is doomed to utter disappointment, for the council's peace committee anticipated this action on the part of shipyard owners and has prepared a definite plan of action to meet the situation.

This announcement was made Monday morning by A. E. Miller, chairman of the conference committee.

The whole situation," said Miller, "has been thoroughly considered at conferences in which we have been in almost continuous session since Saturday morning, when two international trades officers arrived in Seattle. Our conference on Sunday was presided over by Dr. L. C. Marshall, member of the national shipping wage adjustment commission, and important matters concerning the future of the yard workers were considered. At the official announcement of the fact that we intend to pursue will be this afternoon."

Dr. Marshall stated Monday morning that steps should be taken at once to determine the wage scale and conditions that should become operative on March 31.

The formal announcement of the employers' intention to open the shipyard Wednesday morning follows:

Tomorrow is primary election day! Owing to the presence of the shipyard strike and the sympathetic general strike which accompanied it for awhile, the workers and their sympathizers in Seattle have had their attention distracted from political matters and the fact of the election was almost lost to view.

Now it is here—and without preparation the people will go to the polls tomorrow and select their candidates for the election that will decide whether the destinies of this fair city are to fall into the hands of the people who have built or are to remain in the hands of the representatives of the plunderbushes.

There are eight candidates who are appealing for your support—six of whom will be selected for the final run-off in March. Strangely enough there is a fairly accurate grouping of the candidates along class lines, four having the endorsement of the Chamber of Commerce, three the endorsement of the Central Labor Council and one of the Metal Trades Council. The four labor men are Robert L. Proctor, president of the Central Labor Council; Ed T. Levi, vice-president of that body; Charles H. Gallant, delegate to the Central Labor Council from Electrical Workers Local 77, all endorsed by the council, and F. J. Cassidy endorsed by the Metal Trades Council. The Chamber of Commerce endorses are the three incumbents in the office of city councillor—William Hickman Moore, R. H. Thomson and C. B. Fitzgerald—and Fred W. Kelly, who styles himself a civil engineer.

The Chamber of Commerce has elected to make this a class fight. Labor's endorsement was given its candidates because they were labor men, it is true, but also because they are eminently well suited for the position to which they aspire, while the chamber has taken the position that because they are labor men they shall not be given an opportunity to function as citizens of this community.

It is a challenge that Labor cannot well refuse to meet, and it is expected that the polls tomorrow will be filled from morn till night with workmen and women registering their faith in the men of their own ranks.

Our enemies tell us we must not resort to force—that there are legal and orderly methods for changing the form of this government if we desire to change it. We accept their advice and present for the surface of our own people our own candidates, when we are met with the declaration that workmen must not be elected because, forsooth, they are workmen. We are told this must not be a class government and then are instructed to vote for the representatives of another class than our own at all times.

Tomorrow, men and women of organized labor, is the time and the opportunity to make the first move toward taking a more and more active interest in our own affairs. Let those who sneer at political action throw their pet theories aside for one day and make a special effort to get to the polls and vote for the candidates endorsed by labor. What if they do not do all you want, you will at least have shown your enemies that you stand shoulder to shoulder politically as well as industrially and that in the future you are going to take that part in political affairs to which you are entitled by your own population entitles you.

Tomorrow, you can put the candidates endorsed by labor at the head of the list.

See to it that you do!

SITUATION IN RUSSIA IS VITAL TOPIC FOREMOST QUESTION BEFORE PEACE CONFERENCE TODAY

WINSTON CHURCHILL SPRINGS NEW PLAN Understood to Be Hands Off Policy With the Bolshevik

PARIS, Feb. 17.—The Russian situation was again the foremost question before the peace conference today. The treaty for the final meeting at Prinkipon expired tonight without anything definite being accomplished. The supreme war council had the matter up and was expected to give it full consideration at this morning's session.

Winston Churchill, who holds the war portfolio in the new British ministry, has come forward with a new plan for solving the Russian problem. Nothing has been given out officially regarding this plan, but it is understood to include considerable assistance toward the Bolsheviks, while giving every economic assistance toward other Russian governments. It is known that an agreement was reached on Churchill's scheme at the meeting Saturday, and it is expected that Russia will occupy the greater part of the supreme war council's time for several days. While the British, Americans, French and the League of Nations, and the League of Nations, are expected to support the proposal for a joint conference as well as the Bolsheviks, that a large number of the peace delegates are dissatisfied with the tone of the Bolshevik's reply, and that they are disposed to discuss the situation further before going through with the conference.

Solving Indemnities
The committee on reparation was also to continue its hearings today. A considerable program was said to have been made toward solution of the indemnity question. The principal point of difference here seems to be that some contend that Germany should pay the cost of the war of little note to the American idea that the powers should go beyond the indemnities. With the amount contained in the original armistice terms.

Two other subjects, heretofore unmentioned in the peace conference, are assuming an increasingly important place in the peace work. These are labor and women. Member nations are required to submit a declaration of their intention to the international court of justice. An award will be made within six months after the date of the award. In case of a dispute between a member of the league and a non-member, the latter shall be invited to submit the dispute to the court of justice.

PEACE LEAGUE PLEASES TAFT

His Endorsement Will Carry Considerable Weight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—President Taft's endorsement of the league of nations constitution was regarded here today as likely to have considerable weight with Republican senators. The main point of difference was held as to whether the nation will use a referendum or some of America's sovereignty. While some contend that the league constitution tends to infringe upon the national constitution, there was little discussion of the matter. The president's appeal to curbs discussion to arrive and confides the inwardness of the document to foreign relations committee members, served to do much of the talk. While there was no positive assurance that discussion of the league would be held in the senate, administration members were disposed to head it off. The Republicans showed a tendency to make the strike a verdict rather than a referendum.
