## UNION MEN TO IGNORE OFFER

The following statement was issued by the Metal Trades Council at noon today:

"Metal trades strikers will stand pat. The shipyards and shops may open up Wednesday morning but they will not operate with members of the unions affiliated with the Metal Trades Council—for the following reasons:

"1. The strikers are not defeated and will remain out on strike for an adjustment of wage rates.

"2. The plan under which the yards are intending to operate is a violation of the agreement with the International Union of Shipyard Workers, Local No. 40, which provides for the employment of the yard and shops are intending to hire men at the gate, which shows plainly that the employers are intending to discriminate against those who have been active in the shipyard strike. This will not be tolerated by the unions and the international will be forced, according to the constitutions, to support all local unions and their members in this matter.

"3. The plan and statements of the employers, as well as Mr. Piez, show plainly that they intend to reduce all workmen to the Macy scale. This means a decided reduction in wages. This is a violation of the cardinal principle of all metal trades unions and must be repudiated by all international unions.

"4. All men who return to work before the matter is officially adjusted and approved by the Metal Trades Council will be classed as strikebreakers and will be dealt with accordingly. This must be backed by the international organizations also.

"There are a few individuals, who are supposed to be union men, who are making an attempt to contaminate the atmosphere with a feeling of unfairness and who are saying that it is impossible to get the various unions to take a referendum vote on the matter of calling off the strike and advocating are deliberate falsehoods and the individuals have been in the labor unions long enough to be familiar with the method of demanding a referendum.

"The fact is apparent that a few corporation tools are at work among the ranks of the strikers and have failed to gain the results they have set out to do, thanks to the loyalty of the members of the metal trades unions.

## Troops to Bring Americans Out

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—President Wilson is sending engineer troops to Russia to facilitate withdrawal of American forces in the Murmansk region, members of the house military committee today said, following reading to the committee of a presidential communication by Secretary of War Baker.

# MACHINISTS BACKED BY INTERNATIONAL

There were three significant developments in the strike situation Monday night:

An international officer of one of the biggest metal trades unions advised the shipyard workers to stand solidly together and remain out until the strike is officially called off.

The rank and file of the second largest union in the Metal Trades Council, the machinists, at an enthusiastic meeting that packed the Labor Temple, expressed their determination to stand pat.

The much-heralded attempt to split the Steam and Operating Engineers' Union, Local No. 40, proved to be an utter failure, for at the biggest meeting the union has ever held the members voted practically unanimously to stay out on strike and emphatically endorsed the actions of the Metal Trades conference committee.

That all strikers should unite in a monster parade past the shipyard gates carrying American flags was a suggestion made by James A. Taylor, president of the Metal Trades Council at the meeting of Hope Lodge No. 79 of machinists in the Labor Temple. The address was followed by an enthusiastic vote of confidence in the conference committee of the Metal Trades Council.

Hannon for Solidarity

William Hannon, representing the general executive board of the International Association of Machinists, advised the machinists that they should stand solidly together and act as a unit in the strike, refusing to return to work until the entire organization decides to do so.

He indicated that there was not much likelihood that the international officers would consent to play the game of the house by opposing the local unions. "I have not yet made my report," said Hannon, when asked his attitude on the strike, "but you can depend upon it that the international will be solid with the welfare of the local union."

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### NO RETURNING OF THE WEEDY EASY FOR TACOMAS

Boilermakers and Machinists Vote to Stay Out

EXPECT SMALLER UNIONS TO FOLLOW

Local Press in Vain Tries to Disrupt Various Unions

TACOMA, Feb. 18.—Despite all efforts upon the part of the alleged owners, members of the Management Committee of the city of Tacoma, who were present at the meeting of the unionists on Wednesday, Feb. 17, refused to return to work on the Tacoma shipyard. The unionists are again making a bold bid for the continuance of the present strike.

The notice appearing upon the gates of the local shipyard that the yards would be closed on Wednesday was met by the boilermakers last night in a session when that organization voted almost unanimously to stay out on strike until a reasonable settlement was effected.

Despite the size and cry of a few so-called radicals, that Tom Russell was preventing them from gaining entrance and allowing the men to return to work, Mr. Russell was not present at the meeting of last night. The conservative members of the local night with feelings as buoyant as those of the so-called radicals. Every member now feels morally certain of their strike.

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### ESPIONAGE ACT NOT UTILIZED TO GET SPIES

Only Free Speech Convictions Obtained Under It

JUST POLICY OF U. S. IN PAST IS CITED

Actual Rebels Against Government Granted Amnesty

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Mass meetings for the purpose of securing the release of political prisoners and the repeal of the Espionage Act, which was passed during the week of Lincoln's birthday in 1917, were held in the National Civil Liberties Bureau, which has issued the following statement from its headquarters, 41 West Street, New York City.

The bureau has had since the beginning of the present standing order of the United States to discontinue the espionage law. As a result we have the most illuminating record of cases which it has been possible to compile without access to the records of the attorney general. We have no record of a single instance when a spy has been imprisoned under this law.

Furthermore, in the cases cited in the attorney general's report as typical of those prosecuted under the espionage law, there is not one case in which the defendant was convicted of being a paid German spy, or of ever trying to find out military secrets. All the convictions which are reported in section 13 of the report, under the heading of espionage, are in two years. So far as any record of cases of this nature which are reported under the espionage act have been terminated by the attorney general, without imprisonment. On the other hand, there have been many cases of espionage which have not been reported in the attorney general's report.

A Juster Past

It has not hitherto been the policy of the government of the United States to impose long terms of imprisonment on individuals who oppose the decisions of the majority of the government. It is far in their position as to take up the case of the espionage act in 1917. Washington proclaimed a national day of mourning for the western Pennsylvania who had been sentenced to as high as 20 years in the penitentiary for espionage. 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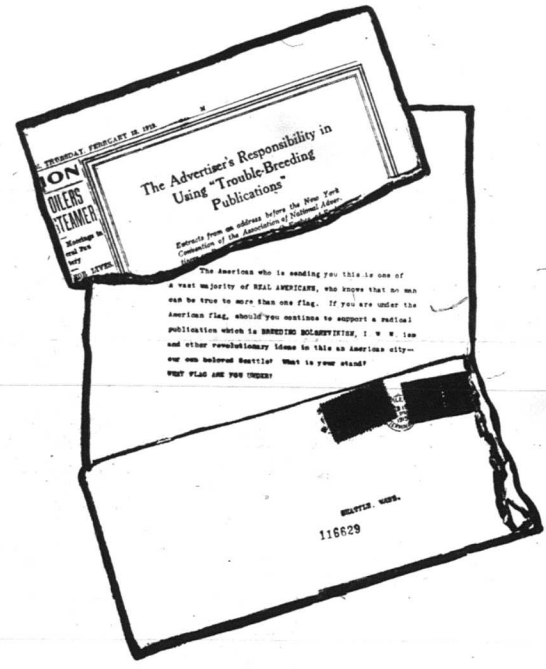
