ANNOUNCEMENT OF STRIKE

A general strike of all the union workmen in Seattle was decided upon definitely at a meeting held in the Labor Temple Sunday, February 2, 1919, when the date for the general strike was set for 10 a. m. Thursday, Febru-ary 6, 1919.

Plans are perfected by the workers to feed the strikers and public at places which will be announced later by this committee. The plans, as outlined by a committee of the culinary trades, will insure the strikers and public in general no hardships or privations so far as having suitable places to eat are concerned.

A committee has been appointed to visit the Metal eles and Central Labor Councils of Tacoma, who had to call a general strike for Tuesday, February 4, at 12 o'clock noon, to prevail upon them to postpone action until Thursday at 10 a, m., so as to act simultaneouswith the Seattle Unions, thereby effecting a solid front, indorsing the metal tradesmen in their demands. This action by the local unions will effectively tie up all the industries in both Seattle and Tacoma, as well as in other shipbuilding centers in the State of Washington.

A committee was appointed, to be known as a committee on tactics, to work in conjunction with a commitee of the Metal Trades Council, to send out notices to all local unions regarding the local unions regarding the general strike; also to work out plans to extend the strike to other localities, and to be in readiness to be dispatched to any place that the general committee may deem expedient to carry on this work.

An executive committee has been appointed to formulate ways and means of conducting an orderly strike, ind to bring the strike to a speedy and favorable conclusion for the workers. This committee will meet ev-ery day at 1 p. m. in the Labor Temple.

The meeting Sunday was composed of representaves from 110 local unions, consisting of all crafts in eattle. Its decisions were unanimous. The meeting onvened at 8 a.m. and was not concluded until a late
