"Scrap of Paper"

BETHEM STEEL DISREGARDS RULE MADE BY THE WAR BOARD

Schwab's Corporation Admits That It Lied to Former President Taft and Other Members of War Labor Board When It Made Agreement

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (By Mail).—Bethlehem Steel has torn up its "scrap of paper"—the award of the National War Labor Board, under which shop committees elected in the shop by the employees of the company were to be recognized by the company in settling all industrial disputes.

The final admission that Schwab's corporation lied to former President Taft and the rest of the war labor board when they agreed to abide by the award, was made in public session Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Taft was indignant. Attorney Currier for Bethlehem Steel was smooth and snubbing, but stubborn. He said that the war is over, and 11,000 men have been discharged from the plant, and that it would be absurd to expect the company to acknowledge the authority of committees elected before the armistice was signed. More than that, his company considered that the power of the war labor board no longer can compel it to deal with its men as the board sees fit.

Takes Crushing Lead
This means only one thing—that Bethlehem Steel takes the lead among big anti-union employers in a vast movement, designed to provoke violence and the repression of the rights of workers in every industrial center in America where labor is not in political power.
