



SEATTLE, the city of wonders and of workers! Almost overnight there has appeared upon the shores of Paget Sound an industrial center to which the eyes of the nation are turned. In no other city of the world has the organized working class been recognized as in Seattle. Employers and business men who advocate the 'open shop' are few and far between. To most of them has come the realization that efficient and effective labor must be organized labor; that higher wages and better exhips considering the property of the working conditions mean better business and a better city and citizenry. No city is more prosperous than its poorest paid worker. Poor pay is poor policy. Good wages are spent for good goods. Seattle wants no slums nor slum-gullions. The pinch-penny-policy cannot find a place to stop and rest in Seattle. Everybody is too busy to tease the eagle on a dollar. The big, open-handed idea's the thing. It's Seattle spirit in its n'th power. Seattle's an organized city, organized for business, betterment and the good of its citizens.
