Frequently Asked Questions:

1. How do I set up a MyUW account / email account at the UW?

Go to: <https://uwnetid.washington.edu/newid> for details.

To establish a MyUW account and sign up for email at the UW go to the UW NetID website and follow the step by step directions for setting up a new account. In order to create this account, you will need the PAC (Private Access Code) which was sent to you by the Registrar. If you lost your PAC, call 543-8580. You will need to know your student # when you call. You can create your account from any computer with access to the internet, including the computers available for student use in the back portion of the MCB office (T-466). Once in MyUW you can link to Computing and Networking <http://www.washington.edu/computing/email> which will give you information on what you can do with a UW email account. For connecting from home, the UW Internet Connectivity Kit (UWICK) is a CD that contains software that gives University of Washington students, faculty, and staff access to networked communication and information services. With the UWICK, using your home computer and a modem or a campus computer with a direct network connection, you can communicate with others using email, search the Web, protect your computer from viruses and more.

2. I am an International student. What do I have to do before being allowed to register?

Upon arrival on campus, you will need to check in at the International Services Office (<http://iss.washington.edu>/ 1410 NE Campus Parkway, 206-221-4404). All new international students are required to check-in with the Office of International Students and Scholars (ISS) before registering for classes. You may need to check it at the FIUTS (The Foundation for International Understanding Through Students) office before going to ISS. New student check-in times are Tuesdays and Thursdays at 11 a.m. throughout the year however additional days/times in August and September will be added. View the ISS website in advance for the latest information. Bring your I-20 or DS-2019, passport, and I-94 card. The International Students and Scholars Office provides assistance to international students, scholars, and faculty in meeting United States Immigration and Naturalization Service regulations dealing with such matters as maintaining lawful status, extensions of stay, transfers of schools/programs, and working authorizations. The Office also provides a formal orientation to the campus and community for new international students and visiting faculty; advice and counsel for educational, financial, and personal problems; and dissemination of important and timely information through newsletters and workshops.

3. How do I register?

Go to: <http://myuw.washington.edu> for details. You register by using the **MyUW** system. Simply go to the MyUW website and follow the instructions for logging on. Once you are in the MyUW site, choose the "Student" tab, then choose "Registration" under the "Student Personal Services" heading, and follow the instructions for online registration. You will be registering after Orientation on September 5th. We will give you all the MCB course information on that day. (Note: see below for **important** insurance information)

4. Do I sign up for the student insurance offered through MyUW when I register?

(Note: there are **two** insurance programs; General Student Insurance and Graduate Appointee Insurance Plan [GAIP].) When you register and are asked about student insurance, it's referring to **General** student insurance. You will only sign up for this if you're an **international** student. You must sign up for the [General Student Insurance Plan](#) coverage when you register to meet insurance requirements of your visa. Once you've registered and you have confirmed the entry of your GAIP-eligible appointment with MCB's payroll coordinator, you must then enroll yourself and any eligible dependents in GAIP by completing the [online enrollment process](#).

Domestic graduate students should say **no** to the student insurance offered when registering online for classes; you will be billed for the cost. Graduate students receive GAIP medical, dental and vision coverage paid by the MCB program which is more comprehensive than the student insurance that students can purchase.

A. "All eligible employees **MUST** enroll themselves and their dependents online every fall quarter **EVEN IF THEY HAD PREVIOUS GAIP COVERAGE.**" Of course, for first year students this particularly applies. Enrollment must take place on or before Oct. 31st, but we urge you to do it sooner. If you don't enroll yourself and your dependents by that date, you will not get coverage during Autumn Quarter. Enrollment is done online with Welfare & Pension Administration Services (WPAS) at www.wpas-inc.com/uwgradenrollment.

B. In order for that enrollment to be valid, you will need a suitable appointment (RA/TA/Traineeship/Stipend, etc.) entered into the UW Payroll system by OCTOBER 2. The student is responsible for checking with the appointing department to make sure their appointments have been entered by that date. In your case, the MCB Program will put you on payroll effective Sept. 16th, 2008 through June 15th, 2009. We'll do this at orientation so please, please bring your passport or two other pieces of ID (Social Security card, driver's license, etc.).

5. When do my insurance benefits begin and where can I read about coverage?

Insurance benefits start 10/01/08 and the information on GAIP is at <http://www.washington.edu/admin/hr/benefits/gaip/>.

6. How many credits should I register for?

You must be registered as a full time graduate student with a minimum of 10 credits during the academic year (Autumn, Winter, Spring) and a minimum of 2 credits during Summer Quarter. **Exceptions** are first-year MCB students who will register for 13 cr. per quarter (A, W, Sp).

What happens if you sign up for less? Your payroll appointment, health insurance, and your tuition payment (paid by MCB) are cancelled, so be sure that you sign up for the appropriate full-time student load.

7. How do I find out about important dates like the last day to add or drop a class, last day to pay registration fees without a late penalty, etc.?

8. How do I obtain a University ID card?

You can obtain your student ID card as soon as you arrive on campus. Go to the Student ID Center located at **Odegaard Library Ground Floor** between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The office is located near the By George cafeteria on upper campus. You will need to bring a piece of legal photo ID (mandatory) to obtain the ID card. A quarterly validation sticker is mailed to you with your Registration Confirmation. Attach it to your ID card in the appropriate slot.

9. What is the U-Pass and where do I get one?

Go to: www.washington.edu/upass/ for details. The U-Pass is a bus pass valid on all regular Metro and Community Transit routes at all times and through all zones. Attach the U-Pass sticker to the back of your student ID card where indicated.

The quarterly fee of \$44 will be included on your tuition statement. If you do not wish to participate in the U-Pass program, you must return the U-Pass sticker to the University by the tuition payment deadline (October 10th). The sticker can be returned by mail in the return envelope provided, or mailed with your tuition payment, or returned in person at the Student Accounts and Cashiers office.

10. Why did I receive a statement from Student Accounts showing I owe over \$4,000?

This happens due to: (1) the statements are often printed weeks before they are mailed and your current balance may be different, and (2) until your payroll forms are processed, there is no way for Student Accounts to know that you are going to be covered by the Program. Once your payroll forms are processed (this can take a couple of weeks due to the volume of new students in the fall), the computer system will automatically reduce your statement by the tuition owed and show that it has been paid by the Program. You can logon to the MyUW site and check your balance (one of the options available) at any time.

You are responsible for paying the student services and activities fees portion of your bill and any other optional services you elect to purchase (e.g., U-Pass).

11. What happened to the \$100 enrollment deposit I paid to the University?

It was deposited into your student account and will be applied to any amount you owe on your first statement for activities fee and U-Pass.

12. What is covered by the Services and Activities Fee and the IMA Bond Fee?

These fees will appear on your quarterly tuition bill and are mandatory fees paid by you. The Services and Activities Fee is currently \$229 per quarter and is used to support a variety of student services including ASUW and GPSS (Graduate and Professional Student Services), the Daily (campus newspaper), Hall Health Center, IMA (recreational sports programs and facilities available to students including an indoor swimming pool, racquetball and basketball courts, weight rooms and a variety of other rooms for various sports activities), Student Legal Services, Childcare Assistance Program, and Ethnic Cultural Center/Theater. The \$35 IMA Bond Fee is used to fund expansion of the Intramural Activities (IMA) building and improvements to recreational sports programs facilities including: construction of a synthetic-turf, night-lighted, multi-activity sports field, and renovation of the golf driving range.

13. What is the technology fee and do I have to pay it?

This fee will be paid by the University. It may show up on your statement but a credit will appear when your payroll appointment forms are processed.

This fee is to recover, in part, the cost of providing and maintaining services to student that include, but is not limited to the following: access to the internet and World Wide Web, e-mail, computer and multimedia work stations and laboratories, computer software, and dial-up telephone services. This fee was voted on and approved by both the undergraduate and Graduate Student Senate

14. When do I receive my first paycheck?

Your first paycheck will be available on October 10th.

15. How often do I get paid?

You will be paid twice a month as follows:

Pay Period	Pay Day
1 st - 15 th of the month	25 th of the month
16 th - end of the month	10 th of the month

16. How much do I get paid?

At this time, our students are paid \$26,664/yr (\$2222/mo) before taxes and deductions.

17. Where do I pick up my paycheck?

Students are required to set up direct deposit for their paychecks. If you are setting up direct deposit for the first time, it may take at least one pay period before going into effect. If for some reason a “live” check is cut, the MCB office will notify you by email and you will have to come by the MCB office in T-466, Health Sciences Building after 10:30 a.m. on payday to sign for your check.

18. How do I set up direct deposit?

All students are required to set up direct deposit so your paychecks are automatically deposited in your bank account. On payday, your money will be in your account at the opening of the financial institution's payday. Direct deposit of your payroll check means no lost or stolen paper checks, no waiting in line to pick up a payroll check and no special trip to your bank or credit union. If you receive grants, scholarships and/or loans, your tuition and most other charges will be deducted from your aid with the excess funds being sent directly to either your savings or checking account. It takes 2 to 3 business days for the funds to be available in your bank account once it shows as disbursed on MyUW *or* the first day of the quarter, whichever is later. You may set up direct deposit at any time throughout the quarter. It takes 5 days until funds can be transferred when you initially set up your account or make changes to your account information.

Online Direct Deposit

1. Go to ESS ([Employee Self-Service](#)) through MyUW (you must have a UWNNetID).
2. Go to the Earnings section of ESS to find the Direct Deposit link.
3. Select Direct Deposit and complete the form.
4. You will receive an email confirmation within 24 hours of updating your Payroll Direct Deposit.

19. When can I use the University's library?

You can use the libraries (there are several) at any time but in order to check out any materials, you will need your University ID card. From the UW homepage, google “university libraries”. There will be links to all university libraries and also a link specifically to the Health Sciences Library which you will probably be using the most. <http://healthlinks.washington.edu/hsl/>. This library is located in T-334 or just one floor below the MCB office.

21. How can I commute to campus?

(Refer to question #9) Driving is the least convenient way to commute to campus because of traffic congestion and the expense. Public transportation is very convenient with hundreds of buses running through campus each day and you can use the U-Pass. Biking is popular around campus because the Burke-Gilman trail runs through campus.

Seattle Department of Transportation offers a Seattle Bicycling Guide Map free of charge to the public. The map shows bike lanes, shared use paths, and streets commonly used by bicyclists, as well as detailed views of the U-District & Montlake Area, the I-90 Bridge, the Ballard Bridge, the West Seattle Bridge, the 1st Ave South Bridge, Sea-Tac Airport Access and Downtown Seattle. 22. How do I get from the University to the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center?

A free shuttle runs from the University of Washington to the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center every 20 minutes on the south side of the D-Wing of the Health Sciences Building across from the South Campus Center. A shuttle schedule will be enclosed in your orientation packet. Depending on where you do your rotations and where you live, it may be more convenient to use public transportation with your U-Pass.

23. How do I access the Health Sciences Building/Foege Hall after hours?

You will need to have a building Access card **and** a photo ID badge allowing you into the Health Sciences building and Foege Hall after hours. Following your MCB orientation in September, you will have individual photos taken for these picture ID cards. You will be sent an email when the cards are available to pick up in the MCB office. You will also be issued badges by the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center if/when you rotate in labs there.
