




# Ave You ListENING to ME, Child Abuse

- 17% WA adults abused as children
  - Lifetime lower SES
- Affects all race, class, culture
- Abused children more likely to abuse others

### **Specific Aims**

#### AIM:

Compare reported
 experiences of abuse
 among youth in 10<sup>th</sup> and
 12<sup>th</sup> grades residing in
 Washington State counties
 that did and did not adopt
 the Life-Course
 Development Model
 (LCDM) of community
 building.

#### HYPOTHESIS:

• Youth who live in a county where the LCDM was implemented will be less likely to report experiences of abuse in the past 12 months than youth who do not live in counties with the LCDM model.



# Current County Stats, averages

County	Population	Unemploy ment	Median Age (yrs)	Median Household Income	Education (bachelors or higher)	% of pop b/w 10-19 yrs
LCDM	62,566	8.6%	38.4	\$38,899	22%	15.3%
Non-LCDM	259,999	10%	39.0	\$41,177	18.6%	14.7%

## Study design: Outcome

#### Exposure to adult violence

- Have you been physically abused by an adult?
- Not counting TV, movies, video games, and sporting events, have you seen an adult hit, slap, punch, shove, kick, or otherwise physically hurt another adult more? than one time

#### Exposure to partner violence

- During the past 12 months, did your boyfriend or girlfriend ever limit your activities, threaten you, or make you feel unsafe in any other way?
- During the past 12 months, have you had any injuries such as bruises, cuts, black eyes, or broken bones as a result of being hurt by a boyfriend or girlfriend?

# Select socio-demographic indicators

#### Age

- 10<sup>th</sup> graders 16 yrs or younger
- 12th graders 16 yrs or older

#### Race/Ethnicity

- Predominantly White
- LCDM counties, larger & Latino/a

#### **Maternal Education**

• Most common = some college

# Abuse By Dating Partner

	OR	CI	P-value
12 <sup>th</sup> Grade Female	0.45	[0.25, 0.80]	0.01

#### Interpretation

• 12<sup>th</sup> grade girls living in LCDM counties have 55% lower odds of abuse from a dating partner than their counterparts living in a non-LCDM county.

# Threat From Dating Partner

	OR	CI	P-value
12 <sup>th</sup> Grade Male	0.6	[0.37, 0.96]	0.04

#### Interpretation

 There is 40% lower odds of being threatened by a dating partner for a 12<sup>th</sup> grade boy who lives in a LCDM county.


# Why reduced odds in 12<sup>th</sup> graders?

- Circular odds reduction
- 10<sup>th</sup> graders not in relationships
