Guidance on Changes to Flexibilities for Federal Research Awards During COVID-19

The federal government has exhibited flexibility in some aspects of its management of research funding to universities during COVID-19, including extending deadlines for submission of applications, rebudgeting award funds for COVID-19 response-related activities and paying salaries from federal award funds to grant personnel who were unable to carry out research work due to the pandemic. Some of that flexibility was discontinued as of June 18, although the salary flexibility has been extended - by some federal agencies - to September 30, 2020. We should expect that eventually all will be discontinued. We should act now to adjust to limited flexibilities, plan for a future without these flexibilities, and set ourselves up to meet all of the associated expectations.

<u>Strengthening Access to Care for Opioid Use Disorder Patients During the COVID-19 National Public</u> <u>Health Emergency: Recovery Support Services</u>

Deadline: July 31, 2020

Foundation for Opioid Response Efforts will initiate rapid response grant support for specific projects that aim to strengthen access to evidence-based OUD recovery services for vulnerable and high-risk populations during the COVID-19 national emergency.

This grant invests in high-quality research focused on reducing inequality in youth outcomes and improving the use of research evidence in decisions that affect young people in the United States.

Rural Postpartum Mental Health Challenge

Deadline: September 15, 2020

The Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality is offering a prize competition to address postpartum mental health diagnosis and treatment in rural communities. Entries should highlight successful or promising programmatic interventions to improve rural postpartum mental health, and models may leverage existing community assets and initiatives or create them.

David H. and Beverly A. Barlow Grant

Deadline: September 15, 2020

\$8,500. Up to \$8,500 to support innovative basic and clinical research on anxiety and anxiety related disorders.

<u>Competitive and Administrative Supplements for Community Interventions to Reduce the Impact of</u> <u>COVID-19 on Health Disparity and Other Vulnerable Populations</u>"

Deadline: December 30, 2020

Research is needed to test community interventions focused on the prevention (or slowing) of COVID-19 transmission, evaluate local and state policies and programs intended to mitigate COVID-19 exposure and improve adherence, and reduce the negative impact of the multifaceted consequences on the health of populations who experience health disparities and other vulnerable groups.

Digital Healthcare Interventions to Address the Secondary Health Effects Related to Social, Behavioral, and Economic Impact of COVID-19

Deadline: December 30, 2020

In order to significantly improve near term impact of treatment and identification of individuals at risk for, or experiencing worsening health secondary to the COVID-19 pandemic across the full lifespan, supplements will focus particularly on NIH-designated health disparity (racial/ethnic minorities, less privileged socioeconomic status, rural residents and sexual and gender minorities) and other populations with medical or social vulnerabilities.
