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The Changing Role of LRCs

- Questions:
 - How do we find out what emerging needs need to be met?
 - How to identify gaps that LRCs can fill?
- Solutions:
 - Needs Assessment
 - Surveying Faculty and Students – Qualtrics
 - Departmental Meetings

Our Findings:

- Technology training for faculty (bringing in new resources, for example, Berkeley's Library of Foreign Language Film Clips)
- Increase language programming (language exchange programs, conversation clubs, foreign movie nights, tutoring programs)
- Facilitation of creation of OERs by language faculty (providing centralized website space, recording facilities, programming/coding services, etc.)
- Language assessment services, proficiency verification, etc.
- **Pedagogy Exchange/Resource Sharing/Professional Development Programming across departments**
