Major Requirements

85-98 credits, as follows:

- 1. General Education and Basic Skills: Completion of 10 credits in VLPA-designated courses and 10 credits in I&S-designated courses (of which 6 credits are specified under requirement 3), plus 7 credits in W-designated courses (of which 4 credits are specified under requirement 4).
- 2. PHYS 114, PHYS 115, PHYS 117, PHYS 118 (or PHYS 121 and PHYS 122). Completion of these courses prior to entering the program is recommended.
- 3. ENV H 311, ENV H 405, ENV H 431, ENV H 432, ENV H 433, ENV H 472, ENV H 482 (2 credits minimum), and two of the following: ENV H 440, ENV H 441, ENV H 445 (or ENV H 446), ENV H 490.
- 4. EPI 420, STAT 311 (or STAT 220 or Q SCI 381), HCDE 333, MICROM 301, MICROM 302.

Environmental Health Continuation Policy

This policy will be posted on the program website and provided to incoming students during orientation or their initial meeting with the Undergraduate Program Manager & Adviser.

While the University has general regulations governing scholastic eligibility and satisfactory progress, the undergraduate program in the Department of Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences has adopted additional requirements in order to make the best use of facilities and resources and to provide reasonable assurance of academic success. The following criteria and procedures will be applied to determine continuation in the environmental health degree program. Students are encouraged to review their academic progress and be proactive about seeking advice for problems affecting performance or participation in the program.

Basic Criteria for continuation applicable to all students in the Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health program:

- o Full-time students must complete 9 or more credit hours per academic quarter except summer that are applicable towards their degree(s).
- o Part-time attendance is possible and students must complete at least one course each quarter that is applicable towards their degree(s).
- o Students must earn a minimum grade of 2.00 in each major requirement.
- o Courses used to satisfy degree requirements cannot be taken on a satisfactory/non-satisfactory basis.
- O All students must maintain both an overall and an environmental health GPA of at least 2.00. If either GPA falls below 2.00, the students will be placed on academic probation. Students cannot be on probation more than two consecutive quarters.
- O Students must take courses in the appropriate sequence. All prerequisites must be completed before registering for a course, unless permission is obtained from the instructor.
- o Students must file a graduation application with the Undergraduate Program Manager & Adviser in accordance with University regulations, to ensure graduation once all requirements have been satisfied.
- o Students receiving satisfactory progress registration holds should immediately contact the Undergraduate Program Manager & Adviser to file a graduation application.

The program recognizes that exceptional circumstances (e.g. death in the family, serious illness) may delay degree progress. In addition, educational opportunities such as study abroad or internship opportunities may warrant the extension of a student's program.

Students who do not meet basic criteria for continuation in the Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health program will be first placed on departmental probation. Students on probation who do not meet minimum expectations by the end of the following quarter will be dropped from the major.

The Undergraduate Program Manager & Adviser monitors progress for undergraduate students each quarter and students will be notified of academic probation or drop by email as soon as practical after receiving the previous quarter's grade reports.

Students on probation are expected to meet with the Undergraduate Program Manager & Adviser to determine a plan for successful completion of program requirements which may include repeating or replacing a course. Students who meet expectations by the end of the quarter (longer if deemed necessary for courses taught only once a year) will be removed from probation.

Appealing a Drop

A student who is dropped under the continuation policy may file a written appeal with the Undergraduate Program. The appeal must be submitted within fifteen working days after the drop letter was dated. The appeal should state all the facts the student believes justify reconsideration. The Undergraduate Program Director will review the facts and render a decision within fifteen working days after the appeal is received.

Hello Jennifer. Thanks for your patience as we try to figure this out.

1. We're proposing probation after the quarter in which they don't meet minimum requirements and then dropping them after two quarters of probation.

We were thinking that with both a warning and then two quarters of probation it would be so long before we could drop them that changing majors would be a considerable burden. Our goal with immediate probation is to get them in to see us and come up with a plan for success.

Is warning - probation - drop as opposed to probation - probation - drop the norm?

2 and 3. For courses below a 2.0, they would either need to repeat it or replace it with another appropriate course. We'd like them to come in so we can make a plan specific for the course(s) in question. A 1.9 in some courses won't do but in others we may make an exception depending on how they are doing overall. Below a 2.0 should not stop them from moving forward in course sequences but because some of our courses are only offered once a year we'd like to take it case by case.

Is that too vague?

4. Not sure what that refers to.

I added a paragraph that tries to address points 3 and 4.
