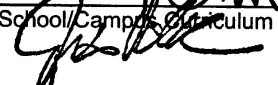

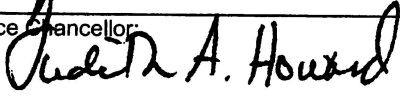

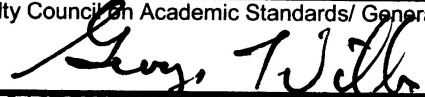

Subject: AIS Senior Project

Instead of a mandatory Senior Project the Department of American Indian Studies will provide students with non-mandatory options. Students who wish to carry out in-depth research will have the option of taking the Senior Research project. In order to emphasize the research process and in order to carry out projects that carry over into two or three quarters students will be allowed to take AIS 498 more than one time. In addition to the research methods class that Professor Sasha Harmon teaches, Professor Dian Million will also offer a research class. The AIS faculty observed that most students needed more than a single quarter to design and carry out an advanced research project.
