- 1. Course description and philosophy: Sahaptin focuses on oral opportunities to practice the reading and writing skills that students have learned in Sahaptin 101 and 102. Students will be expected to use the notebook materials developed in Sahaptin 101 and 102 as reference materials. This course will review the sounds of the Yakama Practical Alphabet. Once the alphabet is reviewed, the course will concentrate on various oral activities, designed to help students develop their communication skills. While the lessons will focus on the Yakama dialect, students will be able to transcribe dialects spoken by their family members, using the Practical Alphabet. Students will receive written handouts and/or cassette tapes for each unit. In addition to language instruction, there will be lessons on cultural mores and traditions of the Sahaptin Indian people. Basic grammar patterns will be practiced. General Education Goal 4/Item 1 will be addressed.
- 2. Student Learning Objectives: Sahaptin 200 has the following objectives:
  - A. Students will demonstrate their mastery of the sounds/spelling of the Yakama Practical Alphabet.
  - B. Students will demonstrate their mastery of vocabulary by translating simple paragraphs/stories.
  - C. Students will demonstrate their mastery of vocabulary through everyday conversation in Sahaptin.
  - D. Students will demonstrate their ability to give short speeches in Sahaptin.
  - E. Students will demonstrate their ability to write short paragraphs in Sahaptin.
  - F. Students will demonstrate their research skills by writing a short paper on the Sahaptin Language.
  - G. Students will continue to develop their resource workbook for personal use.
- 3. Course prerequisites, if applicable: Sahaptin 102 or demonstrated ability to read and write in Sahaptin.
- 4. Texts and study aids:
  - A. Required text: Class Handouts authored by Virginia Beavert
  - B. Supplements: The Yakima Language Dictionary is recommended. (Purchase at Yakama Nation Library)
  - C. Required readings: Class handouts to be provided periodically.
