SYLLABUS KKANAYWIT SAPSIKW'AT

Purpose:

To have students memorize set phrases, sentences or sequence of sentences because (1) the lines are predictable (SV) and useful in general conversation or (2) because the lines contain idiomatic(in the dialect of people) expressions or other "frozen" pieces of language such as greetings, or (3) because the lines contain useful examples of a particular grammatical construction and can serve as model sentences for future reference to help (4) the student progress into reading and writing language.

Basic Description:

Kkanaywit means "doing" in brief conversation. It usually centers around a common everyday activity involving two people(speaker and listener). Because it is intended to be a memorization activity, typically composed of short sentences in a very limited number of exchanges. The longer the sentences, it becomes more difficult for memorization purposes.
