SIMPLE INTRANSITIVE VERBS

present tense

1. Ichi tiin i-sɪnwisha. this person is talking.
2. Ikw'ak ayat i-kutkutsha. that woman is working.

past tense

- Ichi tiin i-sɪnwishana, this person was talking.
- Ikw'ak ayat i-kutkutshana, that woman was working.

In the Yakima Shahaptin language, the auxiliary is attached to the verb at the end, sɪnwi, talk/speak, i-sɪnwisha, is talking/speaking, i-sɪnwishana, was talking/speaking.

Note: the i-before the verb is the 3rd person, singular, present tense marker, that tells the listener (you), this action is going on at the present time and there is one person involved. Look at the next example.

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| 3. Chɪma tiin-ma pa-sɪnwi-shana.
These people were talking. | Kuma tiin-ma pa-sinwi-ta.
Those people will talk. |
| 4. Ikwma ayat-ma pa-kutkut-shana.
Those women were working. | Kuma ayatma pa-kutkut-shata.
Those women will be working. |

Student will pay attention to the prefix and suffix attached to the verb, and be able to identify a singular and plural noun. Study the patterns and write them down several times on a separate piece of paper. This will teach you to understand how the language is put together. This unit will carry over to more complex sentence in positive and negative sentences.
