2. Ikw'ak ayat i-kutkutsha. that woman is working.

Ikw'ak ayat i-kutkutshana, that woman was working.

In the Yakima Shahaptin language, the auxiliary is attached to the verb at the end, sinwi, talk/speak, i-sinwisha, is talking/speaking, i-sinwishana, was talking/speaking.

Note: the i-before the verb is the 3rd person, singular, present tense marker, that tells the listener (you), this action is going on at the present time and there is one person involved. Look at the next example.

3. Chima tiin-ma pa-sinwi-shana.

Kuma tiin-ma pa-sinwi-ta.

These people were talking.

Those people will talk.

4. Ikwma ayat-ma pa-kutkut-shana. Those women were working.

Kuma ayatma pa-kutkut-shata. Those women will be working.

Student will pay attention to the prefix and suffix attached to the verb, and be able to identify a singular and plural noun. Study the patterns and write them down several times on a separate piece of paper. This will teach you to understand how the language is put together. This unit will carry over to more complex sentence in positive and negative sentences.
