Alumna Joins SSW Professor in Innovative University-Community Partnership to Enhance Palliative Care

Bonnie Shultz Letinich, a 1985 MSW alumna, and assistant professor Taryn Lindhorst have created a dynamic partnership that integrates palliative care theory and practice to benefit patients and their families. Palliative care focuses on helping patients and families manage symptoms and care decisions when a person has a potentially life-limiting condition. Unlike hospice, which usually requires patients to forego further curative treatments, palliative care emphasizes holistic care from diagnosis onward.

The goal of the partnership is to provide professional growth opportunities for social workers in palliative care and to improve the lives of seriously ill patients and families by training social workers in effective palliative care techniques. "We are talking about empowering families, not just in health care, but across social service systems," explains Lindhorst. Letinich describes how the partnership will prepare social workers to advocate for patients and families. "We plan to teach social workers how to facilitate decision-making conferences with care teams that center on the patient and family's preferences, values, beliefs and culture," she says.

Together, they developed the new course, "Caring for a Person with Life-limiting Illness: A Lifespan Approach." Offered to the Outreach Program this summer, it examines palliative care in every stage of life. The curriculum includes interdisciplinary collaboration, enhanced communication, decision-making and care coordination along with self-care—how professionals nurture themselves in high-stress environments. Future courses will be offered through the MSW day program and continuing education.

Creating synergy across the School's teaching and service functions, Lindhorst and Letinich bring complimentary perspectives to the collaboration - one that seeks to bring together the School with the community in order to change society. "This is the type of partnership that embodies the spirit of the School's new Institutes of Excellence," Lindhorst describes.

Lindhorst brings a strong academic background in HIV/AIDS and hospice care as well as a deep understanding gained from providing palliative care for loved ones. Letinich contributes her clinical expertise as a palliative care consultant and senior social worker at Children's Hospital and Regional Medical Center. The partnership resulted from Letinich's selection by the Soros Foundation's Project on Death in America for its Social Work Leadership Award. The award recognizes the innovative work of Children's Hospital Pediatric Palliative Care Consultation Service and supports her partnership role developing new courses.

"Children's Hospital has a history of strong collaborative relationships with the School, and we are broadening this through our curriculum development efforts," Lindhorst explains. Letinich adds, "The partnership benefits the school, the students, the patients and families. The School has been very supportive of this project and the passion is there to make this work."

Distance Learning Program Makes Lasting Impact on Peninsulas in Short Time

New Outreach Program Expands School's Reach Statewide

Providing hope from within small communities in Washington's Olympic and Kitsap peninsulas, Distance Learning Masters in Social Work graduates celebrated their accomplishments and bid the program farewell in May. The School will expand learning opportunities statewide through a new Outreach Program that builds on successful outcomes from Distance Learning.

Lynn Keenan, site and practicum coordinator, was instrumental in implementing the Distance Learning program five years ago. The program was designed to bring new knowledge and skills to the human service field in the peninsulas' tribal and rural communities. Based at Peninsula College in Port Angeles, Distance Learning allowed students from communities as diverse as Neah Bay, Port Gamble, Jamestown S'Klallam, Forks, Kingston and Port Orchard to complete graduate degrees and apply their knowledge locally. The program also proved that committed faculty could connect with "place-bound" students, both in person and via videoconferencing.

As evidence of the program's impact, in just five years, 39 Distance Learning graduates have developed 10 new full-time jobs, added programs and improved service delivery in Clallam, Jefferson and Kitsap counties. Keenan is enthusiastic about the results of her students' efforts. None of them had prior grant writing experience, yet they collectively raised \$1.2 million. Their grants will fund a jobs program for young adults, a program to build protective factors for families through Head Start and a child crisis center, to name a few. "I think the graduates left the program feeling they are more like community authors than just the people who pick up the pieces," explains Keenan. "I am proud of the way people have mobilized their skills to create new jobs and fashion services that are responsive to community needs," she asserts.

New Outreach Program Builds on Distance Learning Successes

The effective outcomes from Distance Learning inspired the School to expand its geographical reach and develop a statewide network of empowered professionals through its new Outreach Program.

Started at the School last fall, the Outreach Program combines up to eight days of study on Fridays and Saturdays each quarter with Web-based distance learning. Enrolled students travel to Seattle from as far away as Custer near Bellingham, Yakima, Ocean Shores and Vancouver, Washington as well as Eugene, Oregon.

James DeLong, director of extended degree programs at the School of Social Work, explains that providing graduate-level education to leaders working in the field, "enables us to have a large impact on social services in Western and Central Washington because we're involving the decision-makers who have the opportunity to make changes." He continues, "I have a vision that we can reach deeply into social service providers throughout the state and increase the level of professionalism as well as affect positive changes for communities."

- We engaged and empowered hundreds of participants in stimulating lifelong learning opportunities through our robust continuing education program.

The School continues to flourish as a premier institution with enormous intellectual and human capital. Faculty and staff are deeply invested in our success. Our distinguished track record in both scholarship and educational innovation persists even during this economic downturn. With ongoing help from many generous supporters—as exemplified by the list of 2002-03 donors and the feature article about one of the School's highly respected friends, Ronya Kozmetsky—we are poised to take the School to the next level of excellence.

Ronya Kozmetsky Honored for Her Commitment to School's Advisory Board

Philanthropist and former social worker bestowed with honorary lifetime membership

During a decade of service on the School of Social Work's Advisory Board, Ronya Kozmetsky left her mark as an influential advisor and gracious ambassador. She helped raise awareness of the School's innovative programs and goals and assisted in securing public and private funds to support the School.

"Ronya was unwavering in her commitment to the School," says professor and dean emeritus Nancy Hooyman, who worked closely with Kozmetsky during her Board membership. "She has a tremendous dedication to social justice, supporting research and practice on the issues that are the greatest concern to social workers, such as prevention with high-risk families and eradication of the deep inequities associated with poverty."

Kozmetsky says she advanced the mission of the School because it reflected her personal convictions. "My values involve helping people help themselves," she states. "The School helps people find their role in society."

Ronya and her late husband George Kozmetsky have been strong supporters of the School's mission. George died in April of this year and will be fondly remembered for his many positive influences on the University. Ronya is especially proud of their work to secure funds for the School's first endowed professorship for Dr. J. David Hawkins' research in prevention of behavioral problems among children and youth. She also commends the School's success in diversifying the field of social work. "It's absolutely imperative to recruit a culturally diverse student body as our society becomes increasingly diverse," Kozmetsky declares.



Ronya and George Kozmetsky both attended the University of Washington. Ronya, a 1943 sociology graduate, studied in the Masters of Social Work program briefly before marrying George, a graduate of the UW School of Business. She worked as a social worker and went on to chair the RGK Foundation Board of Directors, which supports research and projects in education and community as well as health and medicine. Since retiring in 1996, she serves as trustee for the RGK foundation. Active in women's issues, Kozmetsky founded Women in Management and was named one of the century's 100 most influential women in Texas by the Texas Women's Chamber of Commerce. She wrote *Women in Business: Succeeding As a Manager, Professional, or Entrepreneur* and co-authored *Making It Together: A Survival Manual for the Executive Family*, with George Kozmetsky. She is highly regarded nationally for her initiative in fostering women's leadership.

Ronya Kozmetsky emphasizes the continuing importance of the School's Advisory Board: "The community should realize what a gem they have in the School of Social Work – the Board is a wonderful catalyst to do this."

As an honorary member of the Advisory Board, Kozmetsky will continue to influence the School's mission. "We are honored that Ronya will continue to stay involved with the School," says Dean Dorothy Van Soest. "She has already left a lasting legacy."

This award is given to a UW faculty member for visionary leadership in community-based instruction and commitment to service learning, public service internships, and community partnerships—particularly for economically disadvantaged populations and communities of color.

Ron Jackson, affiliate professor, was awarded the Nyswander-Dole Award for outstanding contributions to methadone treatment at the National Conference of the American Association for the Treatment of Opioid Dependence.

Susan Kemp, associate professor and associate dean for professional degree programs was awarded a 2003 UW Distinguished Teaching Award. She was chosen from faculty across the University based on criteria such as mastery, enthusiasm and innovation in the teaching/learning process; ability to engage students in and outside the classroom; ability to inspire independent and original thinking in students and innovations in course and curriculum design.

Karen Lincoln, acting assistant professor, received a noted Hartford Scholar Award. The highly competitive fund received its largest pool of applicants this year.

Ratnesh Nagda, assistant professor, received a faculty teaching and research exchange grant for the 2003-04 academic year. The grant will enable him to explore developing a substantive, mutually beneficial program with our School, the Desmond Tutu Peace Center in Cape Town, South Africa, and the Program on Peace Building and Conflict Transformation in Oslo, Norway.

Karina Walters, associate professor, was awarded the 2002 Association for Women in Psychology (AWP) award for her outstanding paper that contributes significantly to the understanding of women of color. Co-authored with Jane Simoni, the article "Trauma, Substance Use, and HIV Risk Among Urban American Indian Women" was published in 1999 in *Cultural Diversity and Ethnic Psychology*.
