		Slavic Department Russian Placement Test	August 5 1:00-2:00	This is a 6-page written test covering basic Russian language taught in the first 3 years of Russian at the university level. The first four pages are multiple choice, the fifth page requires students to demonstrate their knowledge of verb conjugations and grammatical endings, while the sixth page has six pictures that students must describe (some of the pictures are ambiguous).	To find out which level of Russian the UW Slavic Dept. would recommend for continued study of Russian at the UW (Russ 101, 102, 103; Russ 201, 202, 203; Russ 301, 302, 303)
		ACTFL Oral Proficiency Interview computer- based (ACTFL OPIc)	August 8 9:15-10:00	The OPIc is a test of oral proficiency delivered electronically. This semi-direct test is individualized to the test taker and designed to elicit a 20-30 minute sample of ratable speech delivered via the internet. The candidate's digitally recorded speech is double rated by an ACTFL Certified Rater. An Official ACTFL OPIc Certificate, indicating one of seven possible proficiency levels, is issued.	To receive an official rating of Oral Proficiency in Russian (Speaking & Listening).*
		ACTFL Writing Proficiency Test (ACTFL WPT)	August 8 10:30-12:00	The WPT is a 90-minute test of Russian containing four separate prompts for writing. Each prompt consists of 3 or more tasks that must be addressed in your response. The test is written by hand in a test booklet. The ratings are completed by ACTFL Certified Rater.	To receive an official rating of Writing Proficiency in Russian.*
		*Competency Based Credits (not a test)	After ACTFL results are received	The ratings of the ACTFL OPIc and WPT (together) may be used to request Competency-Based Credits in World Languages in Washington public high schools in some districts. High School students in the program will receive a letter and certificate from the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction.	To earn high school world language credits for Russian and to get a certificate of recognition from the state of Washington.
