What is AAC?: Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) are tools and services offered to individuals with significant expressive language challenges to provide temporary or permanent communication support.

Common examples:

- -Gestures and manual sign language (i.e. ASL)
- -Picture communication cards, boards, and books
- -Speech generating devices with communication software and spoken voice (i.e. tablet)

What UWAC is offering:

- -One 2-hour initial evaluation to determine what AAC supports are the most appropriate for an individual's communication needs.
- -Caregiver training scheduled after evaluation
- -Offered to anyone between 2-18 years old with an ASD diagnosis.

Young Learners Social Skills Group

Young Learners Social Skills Group 4:15-5:30pm Ages: 5-7 years old UW Autism Center

The Young Learners Social Group is developed for children with ASD, age 5 – 7 years old. The curriculum is structured and developed with evidence-based treatment strategies for teaching social skills in young children with ASD which include video modeling, peer modeling, role-playing, and more. The group will be targeting play skills (parallel play, cooperation, group play), early perspective taking skills (emotions, theory of mind), sportsmanship (turn-taking, win/lose), and increasing social interactions with others (commenting, initiation of play). There will be an emphasis on communication with families on how to best support your child learning new social skills outside the therapeutic setting through
