WITT WINTER GARDEN

Seattle's best display of winter interest plants. Bright berries, colorful bark, and fragrant winter flowers abound

WOODLAND GARDEN

Fall and winter-flowing stream connecting the upper and lower ponds. Rockwork was laid out in 1938. Witch hazel blooms and delicate branching of Japanese maples. One of the oldest parts of the Arboretum

Abies collection True firs

> Evergreen conifers with narrow, stiffly branched, pyramidal habit.

Berberis (Mahonia) 'Arthur Menzies' 'Arthur Menzies' grape holly

Large broadleaf evergreen shrub, with textured bark and spikes of brilliant vellow flowers. An Arboretum introduction. Loved by hummingbirds

RHODODENDRON GLEN

Seasonal stream along naturalistic rockwork through mature woodland Stewartia pseudocamellia and Stewartia monadelpha Stewartia

> Small deciduous trees with peeling, dramatic multicolored bark

10 New Zealand Forest

Texture and form take center stage with small broadleaf evergreens of dramatic form against sweeps of fine-leaved grasses over 2.5 acres

Ilex Collection **Hollies**

> Broadleaf evergreen or deciduous trees and shrubs, with bright-colored berries. Part of the National Collection

12 The Pinetum Conifers

> Evergreen conifer species from around the world, ½ mile interpretive trail

Quercus species Oak collection

> Maiestic deciduous shade trees and smaller evergreen species, part of the National Collection

FOSTER ISLAND and ARBORETUM WATERFRONT TRAIL

> Collections of oaks, birches and pines, and access to waterfront trail connecting to the Montlake neighborhood and main UW Campus
