### Lisa L. Lindley, DrPH, MPH, CHES



Dr. Lisa Lindley is an Associate Professor in the Department of Global and Community Health at George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia, where she teaches a variety of graduate and undergraduate courses including health behavior theory, HIV/STI interventions, and health program planning and evaluation. Dr. Lindley's areas of expertise are in sexual health promotion and the prevention of HIV/STIs and unintended pregnancies among adolescents/young adults and sexual minority populations. Prior to her position at George Mason, Dr. Lindley served as the HIV Coordinator for the South Carolina Department of Education, as a scholar advisor and faculty member with the CDC's Institute for HIV Prevention Leadership, and was co-founder and director of OutSmart in the Midlands, a support organization for LGBTQ youth (aged 16-22 years) in South Carolina.

Dr. Lindley's research has been published in numerous journals including the *Journal of School Health*, *AIDS Education and Prevention*, *Perspectives on Sexual and Reproductive Health*, and the *American Journal of Public Health*, and her work has been cited in *Healthy People 2020* and the CDC's *2010* and *2015 STD Treatment Guidelines*. Results from her most recent study entitled, "Sexual Orientation and Risk of Pregnancy among New York City High School Students," were featured in *Cosmopolitan*, *Healthy Living*, and *The Advocate* magazines, and were described as "practice changing" by the *New England Journal of Medicine's Journal Watch*.

Andrea Jackson is an Assistant Professor at the University of California, San Francisco, Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology & Reproductive Sciences. She completed her medical school training at Harvard Medical School, her residency training at the integrated Brigham and Women's Massachusetts General Hospital program, and went on to complete sub-speciality training in Family Planning at the University of California, San Francisco. As a faculty member, she has been the Medical Director of the San Francisco General Hospital Obstetrics and Gynecology Outpatient Clinic and is now currently the Director of Complex Contraception at Mt. Zion. Her research interests include provider bias in contraception counseling based on patient's race/ethnicity.

## Karen Hays



Karen Hays is a Certified Nurse-Midwife from Seattle. She is an adjunct member of the Bastyr University faculty, in the Department of Midwifery.

Karen practiced as a home birth and hospital midwife in the Seattle area from 1993-2011, and has worked in both clinical practice and midwifery education in Africa, Asia, and Latin America. She taught at Seattle Midwifery School during the 1990s, and returned in 2012 as a faculty member to this direct-entry midwifery program after the merger with Bastyr University. Karen has worked to promote professional midwifery practice in many areas, including expanding scope of practice for direct-entry midwives, establishing liability insurance and peer review for home birth midwifery, promoting the ICM education standards for midwifery, and midwives' involvement in disaster preparedness and response.

Karen is interested in all aspects of midwifery practice. Karen is an active member of the American College of Nurse-Midwives (Disaster Caucus), Global Health Media Project, Health Leadership International, PRONTO, and the King County Medical Reserve Corps. She has worked with MAWS and other Washington State organizations to develop programs for professional liability insurance for home birth midwives and birth centers and also for professional peer review. She has promoted expanded scope of practice for Licensed Midwives in many clinical areas, including pharmacologic medications, NSTs for fetal surveillance, and neonatal resuscitation appropriate for the home birth setting. Most recently, Karen has worked with others at Bastyr University to develop a new master's-level leadership program for birth professionals.

Karen has worked alongside midwives in several countries to promote and expand midwifery education and practice. Examples include working to establish a midwifery association and educational accreditation in Afghanistan, re-establishing midwifery education in Lao PDR, assisting in the development of midwifery credentialing for indigenous midwives in Guatemala and Liberia, and mentoring Namibian midwives to include clinical simulation to bridge the gap between the classroom and the clinical setting. For the past decade Karen's interests have focused on the care of women and infants when lives are disrupted by civil strife or disasters; much of her professional work now takes place in refugee camps and disaster-medicine mobile clinics (Liberia, Banda Aceh, Kashmir, Haiti, Philippines, Uganda border regions with DRC and S. Sudan), promoting midwifery-model care and assisting local midwives to rebuild their clinics.
