

Director's Notes

A HAPPY END FOR HAPPY END

ON September 2, 1929, Bertolt Brecht and Kurt Weill's musical play, *Happy End*, opened in Berlin. As unlikely as it seems, they were the reigning musical-comedy sensation of Europe. Everywhere you went people were singing the clever, cynical songs from *THE THREE PENNY OPERA*, their smash hit of the previous year.

The reports of what actually occurred opening night differ widely. By all accounts, the first two acts of *HAPPY END* went well. But the third act took a turn for the worse. The Fly's last speech, which seems innocuous enough in the original German text, aroused violent booing from the expensive seats, which in turn stimulated angry shouts from the gallery. Some say that Brecht had secretly re-written the speech for his wife, who was portraying Fhe Fly, to offend the middle-class in the audience; others stated that she improvised an attack on capitalism; still others stated, that she pulled out a communist-party pamphlet from her costume and began haranguing the audience. Whatever took place, the night ended in a shambles. The reviews the following morning were scathing and the show closed two days later.

Brecht refused to take credit for the script (he never denied authorship of the lyrics), stating that it was written by his secretary, Elisabeth Hauptmann. When the play was finally revived in Germany in 1958 she instructed the publisher to use the name "Dorothy Lane" on the title page. But whatever the problems with the script, there is no denying that this "Melodrama with Songs" contains some of the greatest theatre music ever written.

Not until 1972, when Robert Brustein for the Yale Repertory atre commissioned Michael Feingold to adapt the play, did the U.S. have the opportunity to see it. The adaptation alters the script and re-orders the songs, but everything of importance is still there.

So travel back with us to the Chicago of gangsters and Salvation Army dolls and experience Brecht, Weill and Hauptmann's idea of a *HAPPY END*.
