

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

The Tragedy of Coriolanus occupies a unique place in Shakespeare's canon as his last major tragedy. It is a creation of the mature playwright, adopting multiple points of view through his characters, approving of nobody, but rejecting nobody. There is no subplot and the play is built around a title character whose deepest feelings remain largely hidden. Set in the Roman Republic, Shakespeare has imagined a society where life is secular, materialist, a struggle for power and goods (much like the world we live in). Above all, Coriolanus is a political play, a deeply ironic tragedy - George Bernard Shaw went so far as to call the play a comedy that explores the complex nature of virtue and pride, not only of the hero, but of the Roman people who cast out their great protector in an act of reckless, albeit democratic, insurrection and leave themselves entirely defenseless. The moral we might want to draw remains open so let us give Shakespeare the last word from this exchange between Martius' (later Coriolanus) patrician friend Menenius, and the citizens' tribunes, Sicinius and Brutus:

Nature teaches beasts to know their friends.

Men: Pray you, who does the wolf love?

Sic: The lamb.

Men: Ay, to devour him, as the hungry plebeians would the noble

Martius.

Bru: He's a lamb indeed, that baes like a bear. Men: He's a bear indeed, that lives like a lamb.
