



Secretary of Labor Is Asked | Eight Steamships Are in Port to Take Charge of Program to Enlist Workers and Main-

WASHINGTON, Wednesady, Jan. 9.—Approval by President Wilson of a program for war labor administration was announced last night by the Council of National Defense. The purpose is to provide workers for war industries and machinery for safeguarding labor standards and maintaining industrial peace.

Secretary Wilson of the Department of Labor has been requested by the President to assume charge of this administration.

of Labor has been requested by the President to assume charge of this administration.

The President authorized Wilson to provide first, an adequate and stable supply of labor to war industries through a satisfactory system of labor exchanges, a satisfactory method of training workers, an agency for determining priorities of labor demand and agencies for dilution of skilled labor when needed. The section of industrial service of the Council of National befense, headed by L. E. Marshall, will cooperate in directing laborers obtained by voluntary recruiting to ship building plants and war munitions factories, which need more men. Dilution of labor is not regarded now as imperative and doubtless will be one of the questions put aside until the army's drain on the men makes necessary the introduction of women.

Machinery for the immediate and equitable adjustment of disputes in accordance with principles to be agreed upon between capital and labor will be provided next. Questions of transporting workers from one place to another also will be given attention.

LACK OF HOMES FOR WILSON APPROVES SEATTLE READY AID IN CLEARING

to Load for Orient and Others Are Scheduled for Next Few Days.

With eight big cargo steamships in port to load for the Orient and Europe, and other arrivals scheduled within the next few days, Scattle will do her share in Director General William G. McAdoo's "freight clearance week," which will begin Monday.

Every effort is being made to make January Scattle's "freight clearance month" and rid the warehouses and freight yards of the big part of the present congestion of Oriental freight. On January 1 statistics were furnished to the Scattle Chamber of Commerce and Commercial Club by steamship companies to show that approximately forty vessels would leave Scattle within the next thirty days with a total tonnage of about 250,000 tons. At the same time it was estimated that 150,000 tons of freight filled the warehouses and freight yards awaiting shipment through the great Scattle gateway to the Orient.

Much other freight in transit to Russia occupies considerable of the warehouse space. Even if the forty steamships listed should not all get away by February 1, enough will have salled to relieve in a great measure the congestion of the port.

Steamship lines yesterday afternoon assured the Seattle car committee that during January they would clear up the congestion of freight at Seattle that has been routed and licensed to move to Oriental ports.

This will not entirely relieve the railroads, for there are hundreds of cars of freight at Seattle which have not been licensed, which were held for the Russian government, or consigned to some ports for which there is no immediate sailing.

Some freight which has been held in storage in Seattle for months is likely to continue to remain here indefinitely, while storage and other charges eat up the value of the shipment. For instance, the railroads have had freight here for several months that was to have gone to India, but in the meantime the government took over the boat that had been chartered and the sailing was cancelled. Rates advanced, and it is almost impossible to ship the consignment via Oriental ports.

Russian freight is here in storage which has already been delivered to the Russian government and a small quantity is here which has not been formally turned over. There is a comparatively small amount of freight on hand which has not been licensed for export.

As a rule the Northern roads avoid

This is the reason why it is comparatively easy to work off the congestion of freight at Seattle and why it has been difficult at San Francisco, where shippers rushed freight to the Coast without booking or license.
