"I have been engaged in the study of the iniquities of the German government and the infamous Pan-Germanist League and alse of the gigantic sham called German efficiency for the last ten years. This could only refer to two books against war as contemplated in German, one published in 1899, "The Illood of the Nation," since in two editions in the United States, two in France, one in England, one in Austria, one in Spain and one in Japan. 

### LABOR MAY GAIN BY WAGE SURVEY

National Statistician of United Mine Workers Counsels Unions to Be Patient.

ALTHOUGH several important wage adjustments have been held up to await it, and criticism from the unitors adversely affected has followed, the report of the National War Labor Policies Board wow Wison is likely to bring such benefits to labor as a whole that some temporary inconveniences can be forgiven, says Robert H. Harling of the United Mine Workers of America, who arrived in Seattle the last of the week.

Hayes, president of the United Mine Workers, nearly 600,000 strong and the largest international union affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, Harlin, a former Seattlo man, has been following the development of the government's policy of dealing with labor closely in recent moths and is in an interview yet abort conditions now being completed by the War Labor Policies Board.

Harlin, in an interview yesterday, expressed the belief that comparatively few persons realized the magnitude of the task the Frankfurter board had undertaken, or the possible far-reaching results that might follow its report. He laid particular emphasis on the fact that the board had been granted an appropriation of no less than \$7,000,000 for its work—mere than was granted by the same Congress for the entire United States Department of Labor.

"As the public now knows through newspaper publicity recently given the fact, the Frankfurter board's forthcoming report is to be the basis for a general readjustment of the government's war wago revision policy, said Harlin, "All the pending readjustments of wage scales, including that of the Facific Coast Ishipyard workers by the shipbullding labor committee, and of the coal miners, in which I am officially interested, were held up by President Wilson himself, pending the Frankfurter board's report. "The President's idea, as I understand it, was to stabilize war work wage scales in such a manner that in the future no wage scale would be readjusted without reference to other wage scales, and in this manner the flow of labor from one industry to another in search of better pay would be minimized.

Increases Are Expected.

"For this reason I would not be surprised if, after the Frankfurter report is made and analyzed, many war workers who have not made definite demands will be given increases in wages on the basis of the Frankfurter report. Naturally this would have the effect of bettering wages for many workers not in war work by a process of equalization. I am taking it for granted that the report will show a considerable increase in the cost of living since the war began, of course.

"On the other hand, I think it will be well for war workers already tolerably well paid not to expect too much. It is my belief that the general readjustment will benefit most of all the men and women whose wage is not now sufficient to maintain American standards of living.

IN COMPLIANCE WITH BAN

In compliance with the proclamation of Mayor Hanson and Health Commissioner I. S. McRide closing places of public assembly as a means of preventing the spread of influenza, Frank A. Rust, manager of the Seattle Labor Temple Association, last evening posted in the Labor Temple notice to the effect that the building would be closed to all meetings until the city lifted theban.

This means that more than 100 unions and labor central bodies that meet regularly in the Labor Temple will be expected to suspend their sessions until further notice. The Labor Temple has an average, probably, of seven meetings a night, excluding Sundays, and usually three or four Sunday morning and afternoon meetings.

"The Labor Temple Association will do all in its power to assist the mayor and his subordinates," said Manager Rust. "We have not, of course, the authority to stop meetings of our tenants, who are our stockholders, if they choose to call them, but we shall urge that the proclamation be lived up to strictly by organized labor. The police, however, have the power we lack to enforce the closing order.

"It will mean inconvenience and money loss to the Labor Temple Association is cheerfully cooperating with the mayor in the interests of public leath."

Thanks to the Labor Temple Association for its prompt and public spirited compliance with the pro-lamation were expressed by Mayor Hanson when he learned of the association's notice to its tenants.

### Tacoma Joins in Half-Day Protest

Tacoms shipyard workers backed up the shipyard workers of Seattle in their forty-four-hour week demand yesterday when 10,000 of them took a half holiday following a refusal of the employers to pay doubletime for the four hours of the afternoon shift. The half holiday was ordered by the Tacoma Metal Trades Council, with which the shipyard workers' unions are affiliated.

For the third time since the summer Saturday half holiday season ended on September 15, the twenty affiliated unions of the Seattle Metal Trades Council worked but four hours yesterday in compliance with the council's forty-four-hour rule, except in cases where double time was paid for the second half of the regular eight-hour, shift

second half of the regular eight-hour, shift.

Officers of the Seattle Metal Trades Council intimated a belief that unless the long deferred wage decision of the Macy 'board, otherwise the national shipbuilding labor adjustment committee, came soon, all Coast metal trades councils would join in enforcing the forty-four-hour week rule as a protest against the Macy board's delay. They were encouraged to this belief by the report that the Tacoma shipyard workers had come out for the Saturday half holiday the year around.


