PARIS, Tuesday, Oct. 8.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Admiral Henry B. Wilson, commander in chief of the American naval forces in French waters, refused the cross of the Legion of Honor when President Poincaré and his cabinet, including Georges Leygues, visited him at Brest recently. The French press invited no record of the incident.

SERUM PROTECTS SHIPYARD HANDS

Surgeon at Skinner & Eddy Plants Administers Treatment to Fifty Employees.

Equipped with Spanish influenza serum, Dr. Frank L. Horstfall, surgeon at the Skinner & Eddy shipyard, now has no fear that the pandemic will interfere with the building of ships in the big plant. Yesterday fifty shipyard workers...

There is no question that the serum solves the problem of stopping the pandemic, said Dr. Horstfall. "Persons in the first stages of the Spanish influenza are almost immediately cured. Advanced cases have the period of sickness considerably shortened."

Starts Preventive Work. Yesterday afternoon Dr. Horstfall injected the serum into the arms of the staff members in both hospitals. The nurses are the most exposed to the disease. To date none has shown symptoms of contracting the sickness.

It's both a preventative and a cure," said Dr. Horstfall. "For perfectly well persons the injection will insure the avoidance of the disease. In that way it's a preventative. The cure for the disease when that straggles in is almost immediate. And, as I said, the period and seriousness of illness for advanced cases may be shortened."

Commissioner of Public Health McBride said that he had been furnished the influenza serum to the Duthie shipyards last night and that it was being administered to the workers there this morning. He particularly emphasized the fact that no dangerous results from inoculation, there is and or no inconvenience from it and virtually no reaction.

A heavy demand for the serum was put on the City Health Department this morning, nearly all physicians coming in at some time to get some of it. By tomorrow it is expected that all that can be used will be on hand.



BREWERS CORRUPT AND DISLOYAL, SAYS JONES

Washington Senator Charges Association With Bribery and Pro-Hun Sympathy.

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Oct. 8.—Charges that the United States Brewers' Association and individual members have secretly financed newspapers in the interest of the liquor traffic, contributed to the National German-American Alliance, been convicted of corrupt political practices and improperly financed state and national legislation, were renewed in a memorandum filed today by Senator Jones of Washington, Republican, with the Senate Judiciary subcommittee investigating loans by brewers to Arthur Brisbane in connection with the purchase of the Washington Times.

Senator Jones, author of the resolution adopted by the Senate and under which the subcommittee is acting, presented his memorandum for the purpose of contending that the inquiry is unlimited in scope and not, as has been suggested, confined alone to the Washington Times.

posedly so," Senator Jones' statement declared, "so that any committee acting under it would have ample authority to follow any lead that might be developed and that it might deem desirable to follow by subpoenaing documents or individuals to appear before it in full or otherwise, in order that the full list or lists of these charges may be established."

The question of the scope of investigation has been referred to the subcommittee and Senator Overman, chairman, stated at the last meeting that the question should be decided by the full committee. In his memorandum submitted today, Senator Jones said neither the numerous recitals in the resolution's preamble nor any remarks made in the Senate were intended to limit or restrict the inquiry. Every charge made, he declared, will be fully supported by documents of Allen Property Custodian Palmer and the Department of Justice.

Deceived Public

Documentary evidence alone, the honoree asserts, will establish the following facts: "That the United States Brewers' Association, individual brewers and corporations have financed newspapers in the interest of the liquor traffic, and have arranged for money loaned, which in some cases was to be repaid only at the discretion of the newspaper owner out of the profits of the paper, if they should be any profits.

"That the United States Brewers' Association and certain individual brewers who helped finance certain newspapers advocating the liquor traffic, also contributed to the National German-American Alliance and financed the sinking of the Lusitania and other similar German atrocities. "That the United States Brewers' Association and certain individual brewers and brewery corporations have been convicted, pleaded guilty, or held contemptuous, of having violated federal criminal laws and paid several hundreds of thousands of dollars in fines and penalties.

Pro-German in Sympathy

"That the National German-American Alliance was financed in part by the government and individual brewers and liquor dealers. "That the Brewers' Association, through organizations whose names have been concealed, such as the so-called National Association of Commerce and Labor Manufacturers and Dealers Association, Business Men's Association, Taxpayers' League, Home Rule and other organizations, have made political surveys relating to the attitude of candidates for office and how they could be influenced and controlled in the interest of the liquor traffic. "Said organizations and individuals have encouraged the starting of strikes in dry territories and instigated local troubles in shops and factories whose owners and managers favored prohibition.

"That the brewery trade and liquor interests have been given sympathetic treatment in possession of the property custodian, the attorney-general of Texas, railroad and business men opposed to the liquor traffic. "Other charges made by Senator Jones against the liquor interests include: Employment of men to dominate labor organizations, attempts indirectly to subsidize newspapers, magazines and other periodicals; payment of tax as voters' poll taxes and institution of boycotts against merchants, manufacturers, railroad and business men opposed to the liquor traffic.

Committee Cuts Tax On Distilled Spirits

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Oct. 8.—Resuming revision of the war revenue bill today, the Senate finance committee considered the beverage sections and reduced the tax of \$3 a gallon on distilled spirits used for beverage purposes as provided in the House bill to \$2.40 a gallon. The doubled rates on beer and wine were approved.

CONGRESS HONORS TALBOTT

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Oct. 8.—The Senate and House adjourned early Tuesday out of respect to Representative Talbot of Maryland, a veteran member of Congress, who died Saturday. Both houses appointed committees to attend the funeral.

\$1,050,000 BOND ISSUE FOR LIGHT DEPARTMENT

Councilman Erickson Proposes Plan for Taking Up Outstanding Warrants.

At the request of Councilman Oliver T. Erickson, an ordinance has been prepared providing for a bond issue of \$1,050,000 to take up outstanding light department warrants and give the department working capital for necessary extensions. The light department has a warrant debt of approximately \$900,000, about half of which was incurred in extensions and other permanent improvements. If the bond issue is authorized, Councilman Erickson proposes to take up all the warrants issued to pay for permanent work, pay for the connection with the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power lines, estimated to cost about \$75,000, and use the balance for other necessary work. The remainder of the warrants, which were issued for plant operation, it is proposed to take up out of the earnings of the plant.

Should the plan be authorized and the sale of \$1,050,000 of Skagit bonds be completed before the money is needed for the actual construction of the Skagit plant, it is proposed to ask permission of the Capital Issues Committee to loan part of the construction bonds to pay the warrants and not sell the Skagit bonds. In that way, Councilman Erickson said, there would be no possibility of the city having idle money on hand.

SPRING MEN WANT BOOKS

Ten thousand volumes of recent fiction are needed for distribution to men in the government service. According to E. E. Ruby, librarian at Camp Lewis, who has been a guest at the Hotel the last two days before leaving for a trip to the camps in the northern part of the state. The books in the service are now being distributed through the traveling libraries, containing fifty volumes each, which are to be sent from camp to camp.

Seventy-five thousand volumes have been distributed among the military camps in the Northwest during the past year, Ruby said this morning. Men in the service are now beginning to demand books on technical subjects relating to the work they are doing, he said. Some two minutes before Ruby has been given authority to install a library in Seattle. Project South Naval Station at Bremerton, where a library and branches similar to that at Camp Lewis will be established at once.

LOSES BONDS AND MONEY

F. W. Dickman, for many years a business man in Seattle, died at Tacoma, October 3, after suffering with bronchitis two months. He was 74 years old.

Besides by his widow, Dickman is survived by his daughters, Mrs. N. J. Lewis, Mrs. S. C. Mather, Mrs. H. M. Johnson, all of Tacoma; Mrs. H. J. Muth, wife of Olympia; Mrs. S. E. Kildall of Portland; and Mrs. A. M. Gardner of Chicago. He also leaves three sons, George and F. R. Dickman, Jr., who is attending the electrical school at Hiram, Kansas.

WOMAN SPEAKER STRICKEN

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UNDIDENTIFIED EPIDEMIC ATTACKS ARGENTINE KIDDIES

BUENOS AIRES, Tuesday, Oct. 8.—The National Medical Department is alarmed by the persistent spread of an unidentified epidemic among children in Catamarca Province. In a month 150 children have died of a total population of 10,000. The disease resembles dysentery and is highly contagious. Government doctors report that no improvement in the situation can be observed.

ALL PUBLIC BUILDINGS IN VANCOUVER ORDERED CLOSED

VANCOUVER, Wash., Tuesday, Oct. 8.—All theatres, schools, churches and places of public gathering here have been ordered closed by the health authorities, due to the discovery of several cases of Spanish influenza among the civilian population. Soldiers at the Vancouver Barracks have not been prohibited from associating with civilians, as yet. No cases have been reported at the barracks, so far as known.

SPECIAL SESSION CALLED TO AID IN FIGHT ON PANDEMIC

VANCOUVER, B. C., Tuesday, Oct. 8.—Spread of the Spanish influenza throughout British Columbia is responsible today for the calling of a special meeting of the Legislature at Victoria to consider giving power to all municipalities to close the public schools. At Victoria the schools have been closed. More than fifty cases of influenza are reported there.

CONFERENCE AND CURATIVE FRUIT IS EXPECTED TO BEGIN TO SOAR NEXT WEEK

The lemon is declared to be a mild preventative of the dread influenza, and Eastern housewives are serving lemon sauces, lemon jellies and an unending list of other culinary concoctions made from the fruit. Eastern commission men realize that it's an ill wind that blows nobody any profit and have hoisted the price of lemons accordingly, says news received by wholesale men here. California wholesalers have taken up the cry of lemons for influenza and the product has risen in the South to a premium. Local dealers are preparing to follow the lead of their Eastern and Southern counterparts.
