Clashes Between Workers.

It was reported to the labor council that clashes between union shipyard workers and nonunion packing house workers, thrown together in going to and coming from work have been frequent of late and that street car service, already insufficient, had been interfered with by the refusal of union men to ride on the cars with strike-heakers. Special cars, it was complained, had been provided for the later, rousing the ire of the shipyardmen.

The local unions of meat cutters and butchers involved in the strike yesterday sent copies of the resolutions to the President, to the Department of Labor and to the Washington senators and representatives in Congress.

FIRST AID PAYMENTS **EXCEED STATE NEEDS**

As one tangible gain from trade union agitation for reforms in the enforcement of the first-aid amendment to the workmen's compensation or industrial insurance act, it was reported to the Central Labor Council at its regular meeting this week that the State Medical Aid Board had directed that payments into the first-aid fund by employers and workers not under first-aid contracts with physicians or four months, beginning March I.

The state board's action was taken

The state board's action was taken as a result of its discovery that funds sufficient to meet all probable firstald claims up to July I had already been collected, making it unnecessary to require contributions from the workers and employers during the four months mentioned. The first-ald fund is raised by equal contributions from employers and employers in the hazardous industries.

The report was made to the council by Frank W. Cotterill, labor representative on the local first aid locard for the building trades. The state hoard's decision to suspend collections was amounted at a conference on proposed reforms between the state board's representatives and the members of the six Scattle local aid boards, held this week. Cotterill said.

The decision does not affect workers who have contracted with their employers for medical and surgical aid, since they do not come under the first aid law direct.

The labor council at the same meeting indersed the Pather and Son week movement and appointed a committee of fathers, consisting of George Medilivray, J. A. Duncan and Scoty Hofeditz to represent organized labor in it.


