Must Censor Letters.

"I. The employers will, throughout the period of employment and absence in Alaskan waters, maintain a careful and rigorous censorship of letters and packages passing to and from the aliens mentioned.

"I. The employing companies must further obligate themselves to pay all expenses incident to transportation and maintenance of aliens to and from Puget Sound ports, and that they will return immediately, at their own expense, any alien shipped by them, at the request of the United States atternoy, marshal, collector of customs or unaval intelligence officer in the Western district of Washington, or United States marshal, or deputy collector of customs for Alaskan ports. Permits will be granted only upon condition that they can be revoked at any time by any of the officers above mentioned.
