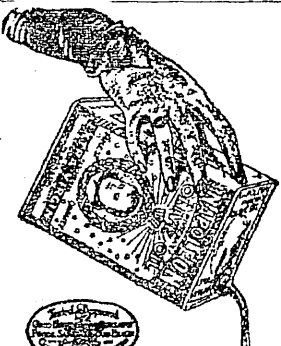

NEWSPAPERS TO AID U. S.

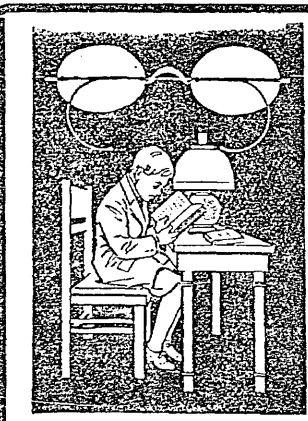

TWO KILLED WHEN BANDITS HOLD UP SALOON

Revolver Duel Follows When Masked Men Enter Place and Begin Using Guns.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Thursday, April 25.—Two men were killed and three wounded, one dangerously, early today when three masked bandits tried to hold up a saloon at Vernon, just outside Los Angeles.

William Griffin, a bartender, who failed to throw up his hands promptly as the three bandits commanded when they entered the place, was shot and fell dead. Four customers, their hands up, escaped injury during the shooting.

Corbet Ybarra, proprietor of the saloon, who was talking in a rear room with Frederick Harris, city marshal, was shot through the right lung as he and Harris ran into the barroom.

Ybarra is said to have an even chance for recovery. Harris, drawing his pistol as he ran, shot and killed one of the bandits at his first shot. The result was a revolver duel, firing continually, backed to the doors and ran to an automobile outside. Harris followed. Another bandit fell as he was about to enter the car, apparently hit by one of Harris' shots. His companion picked him up and placed him in the open. Harris fired again and the third bandit staggered backward, apparently shot in the leg, but recovered himself. He leaped into the automobile, started it and escaped.

Harris immediately gave the alarm and police here began a search for the two bandits a few minutes after their escape.

Ekola Found Guilty on Manslaughter Charge

Gust Ekola, charged with the murder of August Holsten in a house near Seventh Avenue and Dearborn Street on September 20, 1916, was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury in Judge Calvin S. Hall's department of the Superior Court this afternoon. Ekola was tried on a charge of murder in the first degree. The murder of Holsten followed a quarrel between the two men. Ekola was arrested a few months ago in New Orleans and brought to Seattle for a trial.

The jury recommended clemency. Sentence will not be pronounced until the court disposes of a motion for a new trial.

NEWSBOYS' UNION BUYS ANOTHER LIBERTY BOND

Newsboys' Local Union No. 15,834, meeting in the Labor Temple Annex Monday night, voted to increase its \$200 subscription to the Third Liberty Loan by buying another \$100 bond through the Temple bond sales committee. The union also decided to organize a War Savings Club and to purchase \$250 worth of War Savings Stamps on June 1 out of War Savings of an outdoor carnival the union is planning to hold May 18 to 26. N. P. Birch was made secretary of the savings club.

That its members have subscribed for nearly \$2,000 worth of Third Liberty Loan bonds as individuals is the claim of the Newsboys' Union, which numbers about 400 members.

MAJ. Frank T. Liggett, National Guard Reserve, state of Washington, is called into federal service, in accordance with a telegram received this morning by Brig. Gen. Harvey J. Moss, The Adjutant General from the War Department. The government wants Major Liggett, still with the rank of major, to enter the federal service at the Small Arms Firing School, Camp Perry, O. The assignment, it is believed, will be for the duration of the war.

Major Liggett now is depot quartermaster at Fort Meade, American Lake. His knowledge of rifle shooting is considered exceptional. He has been an expert rifleman many years. He first shot on the state National Guard team as far back as 1904 at Fort Riley, Kan., and has been on many teams since that time. He has been in many national and international matches. He is also the inventor of a cleaning liquid for rifles which has been considered valuable in army circles.

ORGANIZED LABOR COUNCIL AGAINST GENERAL STRIKE

Efforts of Metal Trades to Carry Out Plans for Mooney Meet With Setback.

By a two to one vote the Seattle Central Labor Council refused last night to concur in the proposal of the local Metal Trades Council that all Seattle unions join in a general strike without time limit to compel the release of Thomas A. Mooney, union iron moulder who is under death sentence in California for alleged complicity in the San Francisco Preparedness Day bomb plot.

The council reaffirmed, however, its approval of the plan originating with the Oakland, Cal., Trades and Labor Council that all unions join in a general strike against the failure of Gov. W. D. Stephens of California to heed the appeal made by labor organizations for the country over for clemency on the ground that Mooney was the victim of a "frame-up."

That the metal trades proposal for a general suspension of work seven days after May 1, in the case of the strike failed to bring the metal trades union into a general strike would not only interfere with war production and bring organized labor into disrepute and patriotism into question, but would prove a homecoming and hurt instead of the cause of Mooney and his co-defendants, was the sentiment most strongly expressed during a protracted debate on the metal trades proposal.

The debate, however, developed a wide divergence of views, and was featured by considerable free speaking. The metal trades unions, composed largely of shipyard workers, fought strongly for the general strike. If the protest failed, building tradesmen and representatives of the miscellaneous trades, led by the uptown carpenters, as strongly opposed it.

The carpenters and the gas workers vigorously opposed even the May Day strike. The King County Council of Defense, had offered the county council's business to an unfair caterer; the council voted to send out notices that Gates did not represent it, and that it was not responsible for his actions.

After hearing a charge that Frank Gates, labor member of the King County Council of Defense, had offered the county council's business to an unfair caterer, the council voted to send out notices that Gates did not represent it, and that it was not responsible for his actions.

After a lengthy debate the council voted to admit to affiliation the recently organized union of Shipyard Workers of the World, which had affiliated with the International Longshoremen's Union. Objections to the seating of the new union delegates and the protests against the petition to affiliate had been pending several weeks. The council at the request of the auto mechanics and the American Federation of Labor threw out the jurisdictional dispendament of the executive board of the Georgetown Fuel Company, the North End Iron, the Coleridge Pond Shovel and the National Electric Motor on the unfair list. The Summit Place Company was taken off the unfair list at the request of the auto mechanics and the Rubinstine and Fox barber shops declared fair at the request of the barbers.

A communication was ordered sent to Mayor Hanson asking that the franchise asked for by National Electric Telegraph Company be put to a referendum vote. A request from H. Jensen of the college of Washington to address the council on the Smith-Hughes bill was granted.
