

## GERMAN VOTED OUT OF HIGH SCHOOLS IN SEATTLE

Will Be Dropped at End of Present Year, Directors Are Unanimous in Decision.

Seattle school directors last night voted unanimously to drop German from the curriculum of the Seattle high schools after the close of the present year; discharged C. J. Jacobs, Socialist leader and janitor of Webster School, for placing Socialist literature in the teachers' room and distributing I. W. W. literature during a recent election; decided to install immediateelection: decided to install immediately a night school course in steel ship-building and blue print reading and building and blue print reading and took steps to acquire new building sites for extra grade schools.

At present there are but 397 students taking the German course. A year ago, before the declaration of war with Germany, the second semester of the school year began with \$12 in the German classes. A few students who have not completed enough German work to be entitled to credit for ad-

mittance to universities and colleges will suffer an inconvenience by dropping the German course at the end of the year, a communication from high school instructors declared. Judge Richard - Winsor, however, insisted that German go out of the schools at once and called attention to the fact that he had opposed its teaching since the beginning of the war.

Substitute for German Proposed.

At the suggestion of Director N. Eckstein. City Superintendent F. B. Cooper was asked to report whether or not it would be feasible to offer another foreign language as a substitute for German and in addition to French and Spanish, now taught. Though the other directors favored the move, Judge Winsor voted an emphatic "no."

The janitor, Jacobs, who for several years has been active in Socialist affairs, several times a party nominee and president of a company publishing a Socialist paper which has been denied the use of the mails, was dismissed peremptorily, though he will continue to draw pay up to April 15. President George A. Spencer questioned the policy of dismissing an employe for cause and continuing his pay for a few days, but Director E. Shorrock, who had moved for Jacobs' removal, declared that the dismissal which takes him from the schools at one, while as a former janitor, Jacobs should be given time to hunt for a new Job.

John B. Shorrett headed a Youngstown delegation that wished to use the annex to the new Youngstown grade building as a big industrial center where special attention would be given to training youths for shipbuilding or other similar work. At Director Eckstein's suggestion. Superintendent Gooper will make a survey of the field and report to the board. At the same time, Directors Spencer and Shorrock informed the Shorrett committee that the board's experience had proved that manual training centers in industrial centers were not as well attended as in other districts where the parents were members of professions, business men or engaged in office work. They both doubted whether the proximity of the Youngstewn School to a steel mill and shipbuilding plants would help attract pupils to an industrial school.

To aid the Shipping Board the directors decided immediately to install special night classes in steel shipbuilding and blue print reading. It was reported to the board that hundreds of shipyard workers would patronize the night classes, and a request was made that the membership be limited to shipyard workers so that, with partial training, the classes could make better progress.

Schools No Place for Propaganda.

Judge Winsor, who was not acquainted with the facts in the Jacobs case, was given copies of the literature the janitor was accused of circulating and his letter to the school board admitting he placed Socialist literature in the teachers' room and admitted he had f. W. literature in the school furnace room which was "stojen" during the election.

The schools are no place for policy of the propaganda, declared Judge Winsor with emphasis. "I yield to Jacobs nor anyone else in my convictions as a Socialist, but those are political materials that should not be brought into the schools. If Jacobs were an isomotomed, but he is intelligent and he knew what he was doing. I do not like the concord his letter and I think there is no alternative other than dismissal."

Classes to Be Open to All.

Several of the directors called attention to the fact that public school classes must be open to all persons, and the city superintendent was given authority to open the school that basis. It was reported 1,200 men are likely to enroll from one shipbuilding plant alone.

Under the Smith-Hughes act passed by Congress last year, Seattle can draw on federal funds to help support the school. The federal government is aiding in vocational training, and the shipbuilding classes will be approved by the government.

New school sites were recommended by Superintendent Cooper as follows: West Interbay or Magnolia Bluff, Fast Interbay, the north end of the district outside the city limits, Vester-Ravenna, Laurelhurst, West Hill, Alki.

From fifty-eight to sixty-four new school rooms will be required by the grade schools next year, the city superintendent said, and he recommended the following improvements.
