MARINE NEWS WASHINGTON 2ND U. S. WORLD TRADE

Surpasses Philadelphia and Massachusetts Which Have Always Before Been Ahead. Due to Seattle's tremendous energy in building up and developing foreign trade, the state of Washington closed the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, as the second customs district of the United States, running millions of dollars ahead of the Philadelphia district.

Statistics compiled by the Department of Commerce for the first eleven months of the fiscal year disclose Washington entrenched in second place. The total district records for June, the twelfth month of the fiscal year, have been broken by the Washington district, which holds second place by so great a margin that the June statistics rank it as the fourth customs district of the United States, being surpassed by the Philadelphia district, Massachusetts districts, as well as the New York district.

While the Atlantic Coast districts showed a falling off in foreign trade, the Pacific coast districts advanced racing ahead, with the result that they piled up the \$428,000,000 gain mentioned in the first eleven months of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, the foreign trade of the Atlantic Coast districts totaled \$1,142,301,822, a net loss of \$714,301,822. In the first eleven months of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, the foreign trade of the Pacific coast districts aggregated \$692,771,528. In the first eleven months of the fiscal year just closed, the Pacific coast districts showed a net gain of \$428,000,000, a statement published in The Times last spring predicted that the coast's foreign trade for the fiscal year would exceed the billion dollar mark. That mark, however, was exceeded in the eleven-month period.

IROQUOIS BEGINS FIRST U. S. CRUISE. On her first cruise as a training ship of the United States Shipping Board, the steamship Iroquois, Capt. O. Beck, will start from the government's training station in West Seattle at 6 o'clock this evening.

APOKAK REPORTS BIG RUN OF KING SALMON. Fish Swarm Into Kuskokwim River District—240 Tierces Packed in Ten days.

One of the biggest runs of King salmon ever known in the Kuskokwim River district occurred in June, according to advices received in Seattle today from Apokak, where 240 tierces of the fish were packed in the record-breaking time of ten days.

Food Shortage During Winter. There was an acute shortage of food in the Kuskokwim River district during the winter of 1916-17, according to advices from the outside world that the first vessel from the district wintered in Bethel, according to advices from the North.

CAPT. THOMAS P. QUINN GIVEN COMMAND OF WESTERN PRIDE. Assigned to the command of the new \$500-ton steel steamer Western Pride, built in Portland for Uncle Sam, Capt. Thomas P. Quinn, master mariner and vice president of the Shipmasters' Association of the United States, was assigned to the command of the Western Pride, which is to be launched by the Puget plant July 4.

PACIFIC STEAMSHIP COMPANY TAKES COMMAND FOR SALMON. Under a freighting arrangement with the Puget Sound Navigation Company, the Pacific Steamship Company temporarily has taken command of the Western Pride, which will join the fleet of the Pacific Steamship Company temporarily as a capacity for 12,000 cases. The vessel will make one or possibly more voyages in the canned salmon trade for the Pacific coast.

U. S. TO BUILD 36 STEEL MOTORSHIPS. Diesel-Powered Ocean-Going Vessels to Be Constructed by Fleet Corporation.

Official advices that the Emergency Fleet Corporation has decided to build immediately thirty-six Diesel-powered ocean-going steel motorships, each of 5,000 deadweight tons, were received from Washington, D. C., this morning by Motorship of Sea.

CONGESTION OF ORIENTAL FREIGHT VIRTUALLY RELIEVED. Had a certain ship been able to make her scheduled run out of Seattle this month, railroad officers declare that the volume of Oriental freight held in this port would have been reduced to normal for the first time since last summer.

BOLIVIAN CONSUL TELLS OF HIS COUNTRY'S RESOURCES. In celebrating the ninety-third anniversary of the birth of liberty in Bolivia, Nemesio Menacho, consul in Seattle, today addressed a communication to the shipping and commercial interests of the Pacific American Fisheries, which reviewed the resources of his country and the wonderful economic development of the regime of President Don Jose Guterrez Guzman, the nation's chief executive.

PER TRADER BURIED BY SHIP'S PARTY ON STORM SWEEP SHORE. In a lonely grave on the beach near Port Moller, Alaska Peninsula, within sound of the roar of the breakers of storm-swept Fering Sea and with his wife and four children among the mourners, W. S. Davis, 60 years old, a fur trader of the Yak River district, was buried today.

WANT U. S. COMMODITIES. There is a demand for larger quantities of the articles imported by Bolivia and the consumer is looking to America for commodities previously imported from European countries.

TO TEST SUCCESS OF SOCKEYE TRANSFER TO SAMISH IN 1919. Success or failure of the state's efforts to develop a sockeye run in the Samish River will be indicated next year. That will be the fifth season in which the state has been conducting the experiment of transplanting the sockeye from the Columbia River and hatching at Puget Sound hatcheries.

PROTEST NEW LUMBER RATES. OLYMPIA, Tuesday, Aug. 6.—Complaint is made to the Public Service Commission of an intended raise of rates of logs by the Tacoma Falls & Port Angeles Lumber Co., which amounts to 200 to 400 per cent increase, it is claimed. The mill company states that the power company increased rates 25 cents on July 1 and now proposes a minimum charge of \$10 a car on five car lots at one time. As this schedule is figured the freight charges will run as high as \$1 a thousand feet, according to distance. The complaint is under consideration.
