



1	01/30/2014	Young children in the home were boisterous and distracting. Facilitator persevered throughout team meeting.
2	02/10/2014	The team was very in tune with the family's culture and needs. They engaged the youth and his father to discuss their needs and wants around the goal of the youth wanting more freedom and father's need to build trust with him again
3	03/15/2014	The team has an excellent rapport and is very cooperative with delegating action steps. Each team member understands their role in the team process.
4	04/05/2014	Facilitator and team members were very respectful of the family's concerns and preferences. There appears to be a very positive relationship between the family and the professionals that work with the family. The family seems satisfied regarding the information that is shared and brainstormed ideas during the meeting.
5	04/10/2014	At the beginning of the meeting the team reviewed the family's current mission and vision statement reviewed ground rules celebrated achievements and added strengths around the family since last meeting.
