

A REMOVAL CAMPS

After being forcibly removed from their nomes in Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, and North Carolina, most Cherokee are moved into 11 removal camps-10 in Tennessee and one in Alabama. There they await the start of an 800-mile journey.

August 23 - December 5, 1838

10 detachments totaling 9,302 Cherokee are marched from Fort Cass toward Indian Territory.

BLYTHE FERRY

In Meigs County, Tennessee, nine detachments with more than 9,000 Indians cross the Tennessee River

TRIBAL O CHICKASAW NATIONS CHOCTAW SEMINOLE

OVER LAND AND WATER



June 6 - 17, 1838

Near present-day Chattanooga, Tennessee, three detachments are forced to leave their homeland for

VANN'S PLANTATION

At present-day Wolftever Creek totalling 1.642 Cherokee leave for

BENGE ROUTE September 28, 1838

Cherokee leader John Benge escorts 1,079 Cherokee toward present-day Stilwell, Oklahoma.

October 11, 1838

John Bell of the Treaty Party leads 660 Cherokee from Fort Cass to present-day Evansville, Arkansas

Cherokee removals from Ross's Landing and Fort Cass include four water routes that prove to be punishing for the Indians 3,103 depart but only 2,273 arrive at Mrs. Webber's Plantation, Fort Coffee, Lee's Creek, and Illinois Campground

March 24, 1839

The last detachment arrives in Indian Territory. The Cherokee are promised subsistence rations through March 1 1840, in compliance with the Treaty of

TAHLEQUAH, OKLAHOMA October 19, 1841

The Cherokee National Counci

designates Tahlequah as the capital of the Cherokee Nation

Colonel Richard Henry Pratt established the Carlisle Indian School in Carlisle, PA in 1879

A Carlisle student was more likely to die than a soldier in the Spanish American War

Consequences

• (harms & benefits)

Rules

 (duties, principles, obligations, rights)

Virtues and Values

 (character traits, cultural values, rolebased values)

Consequences

- Prolonged hospital course at tx Vivian may have seen as nonbeneficial or harmful
- Harm to patient and family of overriding valued family-oriented decision-making

Rules

- •Obligation to respect Vivian's choices and values (which include value of family)
- •Obligation to be respectful of family doing their best to operate in line with their relational structure, inclusive of Vivian.

Virtues and Values

- Transparent conversation about the discordance between the dominance of respect for autonomy in clinical ethics (and often legal requirements) and the family-based values that are guiding their decision-making
- •Empathizing with surrogate decision-maker who is in a difficult position.

Social Relations

- Recognize biases of the four principles and other standard frameworks that might obscure or devalue this family's approach
- Patient's and family's relational approach is a relevant value-based approach, can HCWs learn more?

Paradigm Cases

 Consider precent cases or find a systematic approach to treat like cases alike with there is concern that family-based decision-making sometimes conflicts with what a patient would choose independently
