- The contribution of your team
- The collaboration within your team and your work together
- Your participation in your team
- The perception of the other team members' attitudes to the course and if that influenced your commitment and contribution
- How would you place your own workload and attitude as compared with your teammates? Please elaborate on the differences and why it turned out that way.

Project

- The organization of the project
- The coordination of the groups
- Collaboration with the students from the other schools
- The value of the report and the project
- The value of the presentation and the manner in which it was given

Peer Reviewing

- Was it useful?
- Did you take into account the feedback you got? Why or why not?

Learning

- What you learned or experienced that was useful for you. In what ways did this project help you to develop?
- How you succeeded in achieving the graduate skills identified as your personal goals and if you took the opportunity to learn something else, and if so what
- Your ability to work in an open ended problem scenario
