PARENT INTERVIEW

This form is a shortened, easy-reference guide of more comprehensive parent interview questions. It provides questions that are developmentally tied to the current DSM-IV symptoms for ASD. Please make sure to take note of the following:

SOCIAL INTERACTIONS AND COMMUNICATION:

It is important to probe for both the <u>consistency</u> with which the child demonstrates these behaviors across people and settings, and the amount of <u>effort</u> required on the part of the adult to elicit social interactions.

ATYPICAL BEHAVIORS:

It is important to probe for the <u>frequency</u> with which the child demonstrates these behaviors throughout the day, the <u>pervasiveness</u> of these behaviors across settings, the <u>intensity</u> with which the child engages in these activities (i.e., resistance to interruption), and the degree to which they <u>interfere</u> with the child's and family's adaptive functioning.
